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Our Shire

Central Darling Shire encompasses an area of over 53,000 square kilometres, making it the largest Local Government Area (LGA) in New South Wales. Conversely, population figures for the Shire are one of the lowest with 2000 residents dispersed throughout and surrounding the towns of Ivanhoe, Menindee, Wilcannia and White Cliffs, and its localities of Darnick, Mossgiel, Sunset Strip and Tilpa.



The principal economic activities within the Shire include pastoral, horticultural, agricultural, mining and tourism. Rural grazing properties represent the largest land use within the Shire, accounting for 97% of the entire area.

The Central Darling Shire is bounded by the Shires of Bourke, Cobar, Carrathool, Balranald, Wentworth and the Unincorporated Area.

Our Towns

Menindee



Menindee is as oasis in the Outback, a beautiful spot to soak up the outback atmosphere with the convenience of modern services at your fingertips. Dubbed the first town on the Darling River, Menindee has a rich Indigenous and European history. Menindee is located close to Kinchega National Park where visitors can enjoy spectacular views of the Menindee lakes and the Darling River, as well as close encounters with local wildlife.

Menindee is associated with bold explorers of the outback, Burke and Wills, Mitchell and Sturt, and the pastoral tradition of wool production and labouring paddle steamers transporting bales to market. Many travellers today are surprised to find great fields of grapevines and fruit under irrigation beside the Lakes that Major Mitchell originally named "Laidley's Ponds".

Today, Menindee produces much sought after fruits such as table grapes, rock melons, and many varieties of apricots, tomatoes and oranges.

Ivanhoe

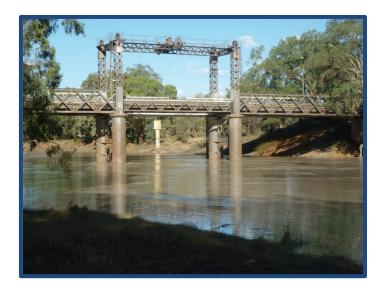


Ivanhoe is a town situated on the Cobb Highway 220 kilometres north west of Hay. The township provides visitors with a pleasant break to their journey in an Outback pastoral community. Friendly people, clean amenities, landscaped recreational areas and a self guided Heritage Trail enable visitors to enjoy a short break and gain an insight into the town's interesting past.



Retrace the exploits of bushrangers, the journeys of Cobb & Co and the advent of the railways as you follow the Ivanhoe Heritage Trail. Through tough times and good, flood and crippling drought, towns like Ivanhoe have earned their place in Australian history.

Wilcannia



Wilcannia has a rich and vibrant history. Once known as the "Queen City of the West", it was the third largest shipping port in Australia. In the boom years of the 1880's sandstone was quarried locally for the beautiful buildings that stand today as a reminder of those heady days.

A short drive or walk around town will reveal the great sandstone buildings, historic centre Lift Bridge and old wharf that handled all that cargo so many years ago. Wilcannia has a large Aboriginal community, being the traditional home of the Barkandji people (barka meaning river). Many fine traditional craftsmen in Wilcannia still practice their craft today.

White Cliffs



White Cliffs is unique! Precious seam opal was discovered in White Cliffs in the 1890's and opal from this field was the first to be marketed overseas (giving White Cliffs the distinction of being known as Australia's first Commercial Opal field).



To escape the high summer temperatures, early miners soon began to live in their working mines enjoying the constant underground temperature in the mid twenties all year round. These were known as 'dugouts' and became home for many miners.

Today, modern Dugout homes provide a unique housing style for many White Cliffs residents-with all the conveniences of any modern home but being environmentally friendly, little heating or cooling is required.

Tilpa



The origin of the name "Tilpa" may be found in the Barkandji word "thulpa", which means "floodwaters", for it is in the vicinity of Tilpa that the Darling River floods up to seventy kilometres wide in major floods.

The village of Tilpa came into existence in 1876 when Arthur Cotton opened a store. James Buckley built the Wee Wattah Hotel where the Tilpa Trading Post is now located in the same year.

By 1894, Cotton's store was owned by David Jones & Co. who sold it to Edmond Perrott who turned it into a hotel named the Royal. This is the existing Tilpa Hotel.

In 1880 a Postal Receiving Office was opened in the store. Tilpa had a school from 1896 till its closure in 1945.

A punt served as the only means of crossing the Darling River at Tilpa until the bridge was completed in December 1963.

Sunset Strip

Sunset Strip was gazetted in 1965 as a village within the Central Darling Shire, 20 km north of Menindee, situated on the northern shore of Lake Menindee. A unique outback take on a holiday by the sea, Sunset Strip is a home-away-from-home for many Broken Hill residents needing a weekend escape. Sunset Strip can boast having its own Post Office and Community Hall with boating, fishing, golf and tennis being some of the activities available.

Having touched on some overarching issues that will effect us all in Local Government, I take the opportunity to reflect on some of the local issues within our Council area. That Council is working with many agencies both within the Council Area and beyond to improve the quality of life for residents. We are continually striving to establish partnership that will enhance the delivery of services and improve the lifestyle and well-being for all.

The continued good season has seen some local weather events that have impacted on most our lives, they include the heavy rain that not only effected our roads network but disrupted the day to day activities of a lot of residents and now with an abundance of ground cover in practically all areas the possibility of an anxious fire season. There are currently five grader gangs operating on our roads network, trying to return roads to a trafficable and safe condition.

Council continues to work towards rectifying the issues that were summarised by the Better Practice Review that was carried out by the Department of Local Government in April 2010. This has been an arduous task, but one that has certainly seen progress for the betterment for the administration and governance of Council as a whole. Nothing is surprising concerning the continual financial challenges that face Council almost on a daily basis; I hasten to add we are not alone in this respect, with many other Councils facing the same dilemma throughout New South Wales.

I complement our staff, who have at times, had to face some rather adverse challenges, but have carried out their respective roles with dignity and respect to all concerned. We as your elected representatives look forward to the challenges ahead and to provided outcomes that are beneficial and rewarding for all residents.

From the Office of the Acting General Manager



Welcome to the Central Darling Shire Council 2011/12 Annual Report. The past 12 months have certainly been challenging with an array of legislative tasks being completed.

It is pleasing to report that Council developed its first Community Strategic Plan, to set the strategic direction for the Shire for the next 10 years. The Community Strategic Plan is accompanied with a suite of plans being Council's Asset Management Plans, Long Term Financial Plan, Workforce Management Plan and Delivery Program. These plans will guide Council's decision making into the future and assist set priorities for tasks to be completed.

A number of governance matters were addressed, with new policies being developed and adopted by Council.

Limited changes occurred in personnel with current staff members remaining stable, however work to recruit to vacant positions continues to remain a challenge. Further recruitment is expected to continue into 2012/13.

Council's financial result for the year was a deficit of \$1,353,000 excluding capital items. Cash assets at the end of 2011/12 decreased by \$700,000 over the previous year, to \$1.8m, reflecting the tightening liquidity situation.

Operationally, Council made a number of exceptional achievements, with the key highlights included in this report. A wet summer period once again disrupted normal roadwork operations due to flooding events and the remedial action needed to rectify damage to the road network.

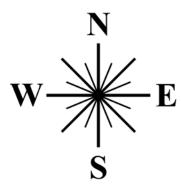

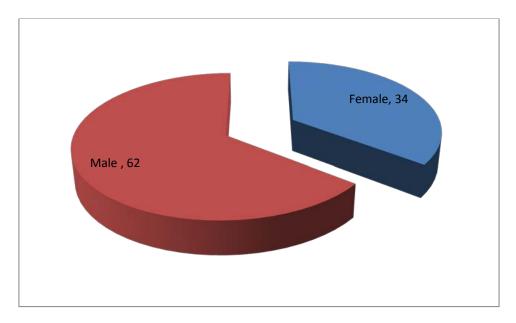

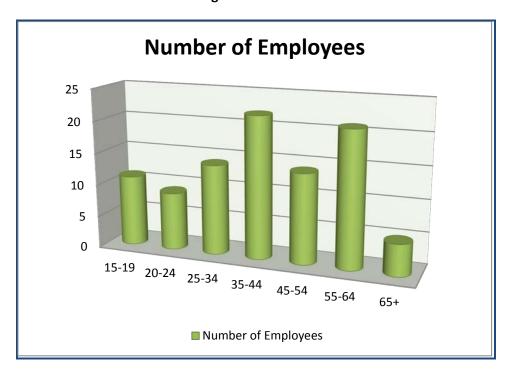

Gender Balance

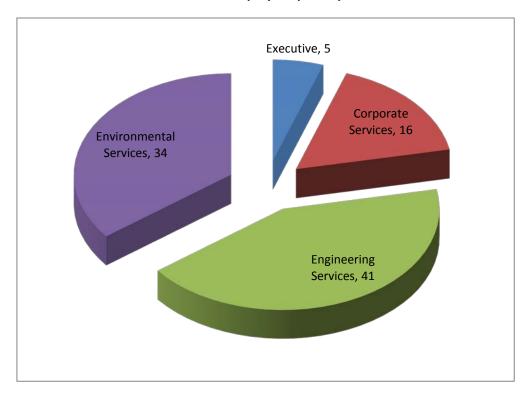


Age of Workforce

Summary of 2011/2012

The Income Statement shows a net operating result for the year of \$665,000, almost double the 2010 result of \$343,000. Items to note on the income statement when compared to the prior year include:

Rates and Annual Charges

- Ordinary rates increased \$16,000 to \$1,275,000 reflecting rate pegging limits and normal land movements offset by decreases in special rates and water supply services.
- Other annual charges increased marginally by \$3000

User Charges and Fees

- Domestic waste management fees increased by \$47,000 due to increased fees and charges.
- Private work fees increase by \$31,000 to \$34,000 due to transport infrastructure works near Ivanhoe for a mining company.
- Water supply services increase \$41,000 to \$361,000 due to increased water usage as rainfall fell to normal levels compared to a wet prior year.
- RMS charges states roads increased by \$295,000 to \$1,928,000 due to move works orders from the RMS on state roads being performed during the year as a result of flood damage.

Investment Income

This decreased by \$411,000 to \$88,000 due to lower than expected bank deposits.

Grants and contributions revenue

• Overall grants and contributions for operational purposes increased by 9.6% over the prior year to \$10,683,000 due primarily to the first two instalments of the financial assistance grant being received in June 2012 as compared to one instalment in the past.

Other Revenue

• This increased by \$42,000 to \$381,000 and relates to funding received to finance the Meals on Wheels program.

Employee Benefits and On-costs

- Overall there was an decrease of \$430,000 to \$4,602,000 due mainly to vacant positions not being filled during the year.
- Workers compensation insurance decreased by \$29,000 due to improving rolling claims history over the past three years.
- Training cost increased by \$116,000 due to more employee training being provided throughout the year.



Materials and Contracts

 Increased by \$1,886,000 to \$7,434,000 resulting from increased maintenance and flood damage works.

Other Expenses

• Other expenses decreased by \$73,000 to \$1,343,000 due in part to improving position for doubtful debts offset by an increase in electricity charges and the consumption.

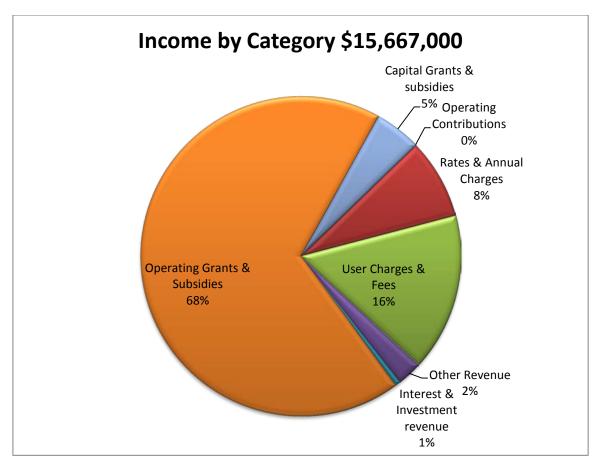
Cash position

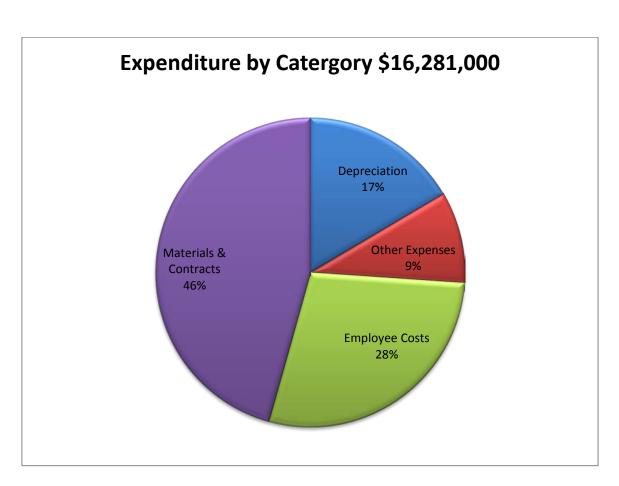
- Council had total cash and investments of \$2,934,000 at the 30th June 2012 as compared with \$3,698,000 at 30th June 2011.
- Of this amount \$2,229,000(2011-\$2,926,000) is subject to external restriction, meaning Council is required to commit those funds to the purpose for which they were provided. The largest part of this related to unspent roads funding.
- In addition \$705,000(2011-\$746,000)) is subject to internal restrictions although such restrictions can be altered by Council.
- At year end, Council had an unused overdraft facility of \$1,000,000 in place but was extended in November 2012 to \$1,005,000.

Major influences on results

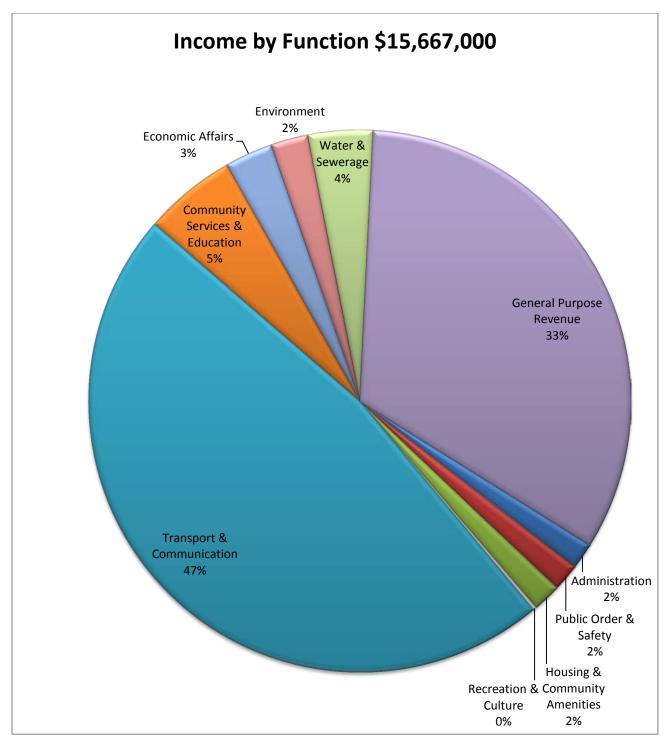
• The weather events of the last three years have resulted in significant time being allocated away from routine works to flood damage repairs. This has led to a backlog of scheduled works and this is reflected in the external restrictions which were high at 30th June 2012.



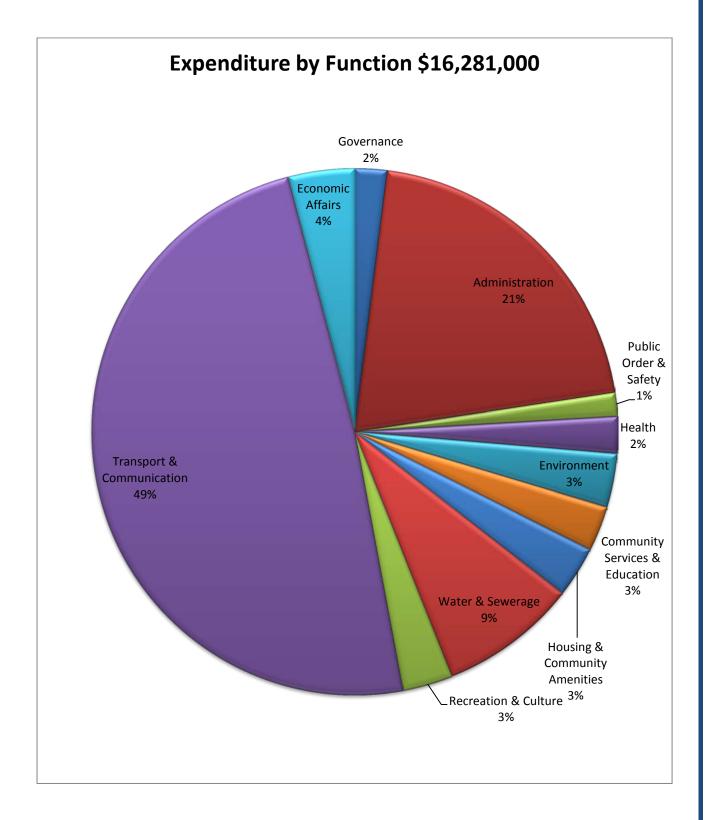

At the 2006 Census, Central Darling Shire's population totalled 1,790 with 38% of the population being from Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander heritage. This is a significant number compared to the 6.8% of residents who are from a non-English speaking background. Due to this low number it is neither practical nor economically viable for Council to place a strong emphasis on the non-English speaking community.

Throughout the Council towns there are a number of State and Federal Government funded services who provide for the Indigenous population and Council has over the 2010/2011 reporting year has received funding to auspice the services of the Community Buses, Wilcannia Womens and Childrens Safehouse, Meals on Wheels and Home Care.

Animal Control in Central Darling is an ongoing issue. Constant monitoring and control measures are needed to deal with roaming and straying animals including both dogs and cats. In April 2011 Council partnered with RSPCA, NSW Health and Remote Service Delivery providers to undertake a Dog Health & Desexing Program. This program provided a free service to community members located in Wilcannia to treat companion animals in the form of worming, flea treatments and desexing. During the program held in April 2011, 60 -70 dogs and cats were treated and desexed. This was an excellent achievement and greatly assists Council to control companion animals through less puppies being born and left to roam around the township. The desexing program has been held 4 times over the past 8 years, and would be held yearly if funding permitted.

Other activities Council has undertaken to assist animal control within the Shire include provision of dog and cat traps to local residents (on a loan basis) to capture roaming animals, assist residents to surrender animals and rehome/remove as required, tend to injured animals and seek veterinary care as required through RSPCA in Broken Hill. Information items have been provided to educate local residents on animal control matters per the local newspaper and on rates notices.

Council has lodged relevant returns to the Department of Local Government as required being pound data collection returns and dog attack data. The amount of funding spent relating to companion animal management and activities was \$99,938.

At this stage it has not be deemed necessary to allocate specific off leash areas within any Shire towns.

Bushfire Hazard Reduction

Council continues to assist the Rural Fire Service to undertake Fire Hazard Reduction work across the Shire. In 2011/2012 financial year, the Rural Fire Service Far West Team received a total of \$104,000 in funding to perform Hazard Reduction works in the Central Darling Shire Council Area.

The funding came from the following sources:

The Council funding of \$56,000 was spent on Hazard Reduction works in and around Central Darling Shire villages and included slashing, grading and burning to maintain fire breaks, asset protection zones and strategic fire advantage zones.

The \$28,000 FMWF funding was used for maintenance grading on the Narraport Fire Trail near Emmdale and Tolarno Fire Trail near Menindee.

The \$20,000 RVP funding was used to reduce the amount of grass along the Barrier Highway through burning at Emmdale and grading and burning to the west of Wilcannia.

The Rural Fire Service undertakes its activities in accordance with the Central Darling Operations Plan – this plan deals with operational arrangements. The Service also uses the Central Darling Risk Management Plan – this plan addresses risks and threats in the district and the treatments for the risks. Each plan is a requirement under the Rural Fire Service Act.

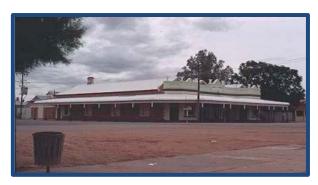
The Old Wilcannia Post Office building has had some renovations undertaken to the exterior of the building and inside the main front room, however still requires extensive works to the residential section and to the yard. Funding to continue the works is required, and to date Council has not been successful in obtaining funding to undertake these works to make the building useable.

Photos of the Old Wilcannia Post Office, Wilcannia Council Chambers and Knox & Downs are provided below. The Knox & Downs building contains the remnants of a burnt out supermarket. No specific future use has been found for this site, nor has a suitable funding stream been identified. Considerable clean-up and either rebuild or demolition works are required before this site could be utilised for any specific purpose.

Generally, the condition of public buildings varies from building to building. Those directly accessed by the public are of good, sound condition. Works undertaken to these buildings are of a standard suitable for acceptable use by the public. To date, Council has undertaken limited work on asset management planning to be able to give a good indication of the funds required to bring all Council owned and operated buildings up to a satisfactory standard. Asset management planning is due to commence in the next financial year. On this basis, Council is unable to estimate the amount of money required to bring the works up to a satisfactory standard.

Generally it costs Council \$325,000 per year to maintain the buildings to their current standard.

Caravan Parks

Situated on the banks of the Darling River at Wilcannia is Victory Park Caravan Park, set amongst majestic gum trees. The park grounds are still recovering from recent flooding but are slowly returning to normal. During the reporting period this caravan park was under lease agreement by Murdi Paaki Regional Enterprise Corporation.

Situated in the opal mining town of White Cliffs is Central Darling Shire Council's Opal Pioneer Caravan Park. The park has had upgrades to its power system and a dump point has been installed due to the increase in tourism numbers. The park has modern amenities. Rainwater tanks have also been installed at various locations within the grounds. This park is managed by a S355 Committee of Council being the White Cliffs Community Association.

Heritage

Council is actively involved in preservation of heritage items and assisting owners of local heritage items to retain and conserve buildings and items of heritage significance on a regular basis. Council has a Heritage Strategy that includes the provision of a Heritage Advisory Service and a Local Heritage Fund. Council receives funding from the NSW Heritage Office for these programs and during 2010/11 allocations were as follows:

Heritage Advisory Program - \$17,500

Local Heritage Fund - \$15,000

During 2010/11, Council's Heritage Advisor visited the Shire and met with local residents for free appointments on 7 occasions. As part of these appointments 32 consultations occurred. During this period the Heritage Advisor also prepared a Main Street Report for Wilcannia to assist staff with planning and development queries relating to the older heritage buildings and remnants/relics.

The Local Heritage Fund attracted 5 projects across the Shire in Menindee and Wilcannia. From these 5 projects a total of \$33,732 was spent by residents on their own buildings. Council supplemented out of the Local Heritage Fund a total of \$12,000 towards these projects. Some of the works funded out of the Local Heritage Fund are shown below in the following photographs.

The Heritage Strategy continues to be a worthwhile program for delivery across the Shire and has been in progress since 2008.

Swimming Pools

Council owns, manages and operates 4 public swimming pool facilities across the Shire. These facilities are located in Wilcannia, Menindee, Ivanhoe and White Cliffs. Within each facility is a large pool and a small toddlers wading pool, apart from White Cliffs which only has one large pool. Council's public swimming pools are relatively aged, and require ongoing works to keep operational. Menindee has the newest pool being constructed in the late 1990's. Council employs Casual Pool Attendants each year to supervise its swimming pools. These employees are trained in First Aid, Bronze Medallion and Royal Lifeguard Licence. Extensive works have been undertaken to manage risks at our pools in the areas of signage and supervisory activities.

Council is mindful of the extensive summer heat, and has installed large shade sails over its pools in all locations. The amenities are all in average condition, apart from Ivanhoe which requires extensive works in the near future. Works are planned to be undertaken in late 2011 to repaint the Ivanhoe pool and implement urgent renovation works to the amenities.

The pools are open from mid- November to March/April each year. The hours of operation are limited to 3pm to 6pm on school days, and 3pm to 8pm on weekends and school holidays.

Council holds a tree day every year in conjunction with National Tree Day. Development Applications

Council receives a number of Development Applications (DAs) each year for a wide range of development varying from residential to commercial work. Council receives in the vicinity of 20-30 DAs per year, in the 2010-11 reporting period Council has received 22 DAs. The table below provides a breakdown on the types of DAs received, and the total value of these three main categories of development. Development in the Central Darling LGA is mainly in the townships of Wilcannia and Menindee, however development in the other towns and in rural settings has occurred as well. Most DAs lodged with Council are for smaller residential developments, however at least a couple of times a year Council receive applications for larger developments. Council supports Complying Development Certificates when possible. Over the reporting period 3 Complying Development Certificate applications were lodged with Council for development in Wilcannia. As part of the DA process Council has also issued 17 Construction Certificates and 4 Occupation Certificates.

Some of the larger scale developments approved over the 2010/11 reporting period include – new Wilcannia Safehouse, Transfield Railworkers Camp located at Ivanhoe, new dwellings in Wilcannia, CDEP shed in Wilcannia.

Environment

Illegal Dumping Clean-up project with Wilcannia Local Aboriginal Land Council (WLALC)

WLALC and Council applied for grant monies to the value of \$50,000 through Environment and Heritage late last year and were successful in obtaining the full amount of the application. This enabled the clean- up of the area surrounding and behind the Mallee which took place early in 2012.

Both WLALC and Council sought the assistance of the Wilcannia Central School and Mission School and the students carried out an 'emu bob' which was quite a success. The schools were supplied with bags, gloves and water to assist with the project. CEO of the WLALC (Jack Beetson) and the Wilcannia Central School took some of the students for a drive to show them the 'before and after' sites of the illegally dumped waste.

Local contractor was employed as machinery was required to move the larger items to the waste depot. Jim employed the Wilcannia CDEP to assist with the waste removal. Large skip bins were purchased and placed in various locations throughout the township and Jim has been emptying these bins on an as required basis. Council manages and operates 7 waste depots across the Shire. Each waste depot consists of a landfill, with Wilcannia, Menindee and Ivanhoe also having broader recycling streams. Council's waste depots are located in Wilcannia, Menindee, Ivanhoe, Sunset Strip, White Cliffs and Tilpa. Due to numerous complaints regarding illegal burning over past years, Council introduced restricted access to its waste depots in Menindee, Wilcannia & Ivanhoe. This means these waste depots are manned by a Waste Operator during opening hours and open 4 days a week on Thursday, Friday, Saturday & Sunday for 3 hours per day with an extra 2 hours on Saturday afternoons. The larger recycling streams provide for separation of large wastes, such as scrap metal, tyres, green waste, timber products, concrete products. It is often difficult to keep these lines defined, as many dumpers do not segregate their wastes, and often the wrong materials end up in the wrong areas. This is an ongoing challenge for Council.

Future recycling opportunities are very difficult to secure due to distance and freight costs. The option to further refine recycling lines into glass, plastic, cans and other streams is not currently viable and Council does not currently have available funds to introduce these changes.

Council provides kerbside collection services to the towns of Wilcannia, Menindee and Ivanhoe. Collection is via 240L wheelie bins and garbage trucks and is provided to 785 residential and commercial properties.

Indigenous Liaison

Wilcannia is one of 29 aboriginal communities in Australia and one of only 2 in NSW that were selected for the Remote Service Delivery (RSD) program aimed at closing the gap on Aboriginal disadvantage. Closing the Gap is linked to a wider reform of Commonwealth-State financial relations. COAG's national agreements and partnerships, in areas such as education, housing and health, have a clear focus on overcoming Indigenous disadvantage. COAG has agreed to specific timeframes for achieving six Closing the Gap targets, relating to Indigenous life expectancy, infant mortality, early childhood development, education and employment.

Underpinning Closing the Gap is a new way of working across government and of engaging with Indigenous communities. Governments are cooperating to better coordinate their services and funding. Clear responsibilities, specific targets and rigorous reporting will help to keep governments on track.

As part of that framework, Council has a role to play in the RSD program. The RSD program is guided by a Local Implementation Plan (LIP), which has the specific purpose of improving government services in Wilcannia. Whilst not a signatory to the LIP, Council is a partner organisation and has an important role to play in the RSD program.

Community working parties (CWP) are another important mechanism through which Council is able to maintain direct communication with its Indigenous population. CWPs have been established by the State Government as part of its Two Ways Together Partnership Community Program. The CWPs are a way of working together to improve outcomes for Aboriginal people on the ground. 40 Partnership Communities have been established in towns across NSW, including Wilcannia, Ivanhoe and Menindee. Council is an active participant in the CWP meetings.



Australia Day

Australia Day celebrations are held in each of the towns every year. Council provides grants of \$200 to organisations within the towns to help with the celebrations.

Ivanhoe MSO

Throughout the last financial year the Ivanhoe MSO has continued to provide support services to our MSO/HACC Clients and the wider Ivanhoe community by providing Community Transport (local and distance), Social Support, Meals on Wheels, and Yard Maintenance Services along with the general day to day CDSC enquiries at the Office.

Medical/Social Trips

The MSO Office is a friendly place where some of our clients will pop in for a chat or travellers can get information on various subjects ranging from local Road Conditions to Native Flora and Fauna, Maps and local history Brochures. There is also a small lending library of magazines, novels, CDs, DVDs and Videos for everyone. We offer a photocopying and faxing service and help some of our customers who may find it difficult to speak over the phone or have lengthy forms to fill in.

Our MSO/HACC clients enjoy morning teas on a regular basis which gives them a chance to get out of the house and catch up with friends. Ivanhoe always celebrates Seniors Week with the MSO having a special brunch at Loz's and A Senior Citizens Dinner held at the Ivanhoe RSL Club is also part of that weeks activities. Mothers Day is another good excuse for a special morning tea with a small gift for each of the Mums.



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Our CDSC MSO Community Bus is an essential service and a popular trip away for clients as well as other community members for shopping, medical appointments, and social outings to GRIFFITH and HAY. Local shopping trips are available Tuesdays and Thursdays and Tammie is our driver on those days. Tammie has been on sick leave and has been missed by all of us over the last few weeks. She is hoping to be back to work part-time in the next week or so.

We have been very fortunate to have 4 new Volunteers this year to help with Meals On Wheels and driving for the Medical Trips to Specialist appointments in Griffith, Broken Hill or Hay. Many thanks go to Fay Johnstone and Lili Kitione (M.O.W.) and Keith Anderson and Peter Robertson for being Volunteer Drivers. Special mention goes to Ron Maiden who has been the regular Volunteer BUS driver for over three years now. Thanks Ronnie from all your regular passengers!

Community Transport for NSW and ADHC(HACC) NSW fund all these services for remote and isolated Communities and CDSC auspice this funding.

Economic Development and Tourism

Council's tourist attractions are actively promoted by tourism bodies such as Outback Tourism NSW and the Long Paddock. The Long Paddock is a touring route that follows the old stock route along the Cobb Highway in New South Wales, from Echuca-Moama on the Murray in the south, through to Wilcannia.

During 2012, Council decided that it would supply funding of \$5,000 to each town's Community Tourism Association. The funding will assist with the development and promotion of tourism throughout the Shire.

Tourism plays a vital role in the economy of the Central Darling Shire Council, with many tourists visiting the Council area every day. Each of Council's towns has its own identity and appeal for tourists. Historical features form a key part of the tourist appeal and are supported by self-guided heritage trails with interpretive signage.

Council Caravan Parks are an important link in Council's tourism infrastructure and are well-managed by the local committees or other groups. Public Council caravan parks are located in Wilcannia and White Cliffs.



Roads & Bridges

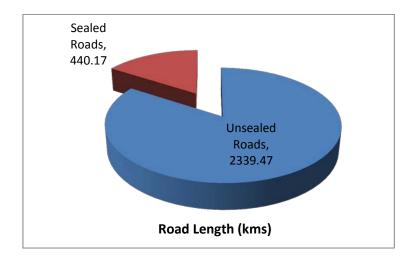
Natural Disaster Declaration

Significant early 2012 rainfall and subsequent catchment response culminated in the March 2012 Natural Disaster declaration. It was estimated that damage has occurred to over ____ kilometres of the road network with an estimated repair bill exceeding \$2.6 million. This amount was comprised of \$900k on Regional Roads and \$1.5Mil on Local Roads.

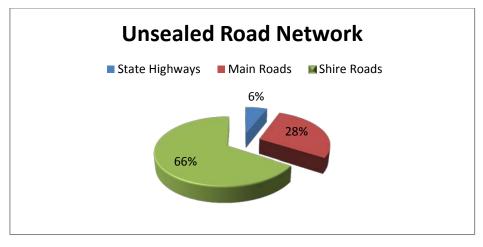


Yampoola Crossing March 2012

State Highways

Under Council's Routine Maintenance Council Contract (RMCC), Council is responsible for 387km of State Highway which includes both sealed and unsealed sections. Regional Roads

Council maintains 790km of Regional (or Main) Roads within the Shire. Funding received included

\$2, 323,000 from Regional Road Block Grant and \$900,000 for Flood Restoration Works.

Flood Damage Restoration Works and maintenance grading works accounted for the remainder of Regional Road works.

Reseals were carried out in this financial year for a total length of 22 km on MR68B, MR68C and MR 435.

Local Roads

Council maintains 1600km of Local Roads within the Shire. Funding received from Federal Assistance Grant totalled \$1,391,646 and Flood Damage Restoration Works \$1,500,000.

The majority of all local road works included emergency flood, flood restoration works and other maintenance grading works.

Town Street routine maintenance works are ongoing and include kerb and gutter cleaning on a weekly basis, tree and ground vegetation maintenance, street sweeping and sign maintenance.

Resealing work was carried out in Hood street for for a length of 0.14 km.

Bridges

Routine maintenance carried out on Council owned bridges included visual inspections, termite treatment and minor repairs.

In 2011/12 Talyawalka Bridge on MR68C was replaced with a concrete structure at \$1.2M.

Restoration work on Old Wilcannia Bridge is progessing in full pace.

Shire Road bridge improvements into the future will see the replacement/ improvements to SR1, Wilcannia to Tilpa East side Rd, Pappenbilla and Talyawalka timber bridges which currently are impassable with weight restrictions in place. These upgrade works are programmed for 2012/2013.

Major Activities

Wilcannia Water Supply and Sewerage Services continue to benefit from the Aboriginal Communities Water Supply and Sewerage Program and the Remote Communities Water Supply and Sewerage Program funded predominantly by the Commonwealth Government.

The Aboriginal Communities Water Supply and Sewerage Program continues to provide funding for ongoing operational support for the Mallee and Warrali Aboriginal Estates in the amount of \$184k for routine maintenance and repairs. These funds are implemented in accordance with the Interim Service Agreement between Council, NSW Office of Water and Wilcannia Aboriginal Lands Council. Additional funds have also been secured within this program for capital works including replacement of the Old Wilcannia Bridge Filtered Water Main and installation of a series of isolation valves strategically located to minimise disruption to service when repairs to mains are undertaken.

The \$3.3Mil Wilcannia Water Supply and Sewerage Augmentation (2012), funded by the Remote Communities Water Supply and Sewerage Program, continued with tenders being called for three separate contracts, being the Wilcannia WTP Upgrade, Wilcannia Water Supply and Sewerage Upgrade (Civil) and the Wilcannia Filtered Reservoir Relining. Works are expected to commence and be completed in 2012/2013.

Water

Potable (treated) and raw (untreated) water supplies continued to be provided to the townships of Wilcannia and Ivanhoe in accordance with NSW Office of Water and Department of Health regulations and guidelines in conjunction with a testing regime undertaken by Council operators in consultation with these government agencies.

Wilcannia and Ivanhoe Water Supply is sourced from a combination of river and bore supplies. In the past year, Wilcannia was serviced 100% from Darling River flows whereas conversely Ivanhoe has been serviced from Bore No.1 (Tooralee Station).

Generally the main operational issue in Wilcannia is the water treatment challenge posed by highly variable river water quality. The main operational issue for Ivanhoe is preparing for the expected transfer from bore to river water likely in 2012/2013.



White Cliffs is serviced by a reticulated non-potable filtered water supply and is sourced from surface runoff collected in large off-line ground tanks. Typical operational issues are reticulation leakage from agricultural grade poly pipe network and low pressure issues. Main leakages are repaired as they arise. Water pressure issues are predominantly the responsibility of householders at White Cliffs where a header tank is to be provided by each dwelling/dugout.

Menindee Water Supply is managed by Essential Water pursuant Water Management (General) Regulation (2011) and related to the establishment of the now redundant Broken Hill Water Board.

Sewer

Wilcannia Sewerage Services is comprised of a Common Effluent Collection System which collects domestic sewage from connected properties and discharges to the Wilcannia Sewerage Treatment Plant (Oxidation Ponds). Excessive effluent volume continued to cause management issues during the early part of 2011/2012.

Ivanhoe, Menindee and White Cliffs residents manage generated sewerage with on-site facilities.

Stormwater infrastructure throughout the townships of Wilcannia, Ivanhoe, Menindee and White Cliffs were maintained including cleaning of the gross pollutant traps in Wilcannia and Menindee.

Footpaths, Kerb & Guttering

Footpaths

The townships of Wilcannia, Ivanhoe and Menindee have extensive footpath networks. The footpath network in the urban areas are predominantly concrete but also is comprised of gravel and in-situ earth sections.

The extent of the footpath network in each township is summarised below:

Wilcannia 4895m

Ivanhoe 2189m

Menindee 1312m

The footpath audit completed in 2010/2011 identified the scope, range and type of defects and also a list of priority works with annual funding increase of \$25k.

Additional funding secured from the RTA was used to upgrade the pedestrian access to the Warrali Aboriginal Estate and St Therese School. This involved construction of a levee structure which supports the widened footpath and provides flood free access. The route shall have security lighting and will be sealed.

The townships of Wilcannia, Ivanhoe and Menindee's extensive kerb and gutter infrastructure was maintained.



Plant & Equipment

Council replaced a 2WD tractor with new 75HP Tractor & Slasher (\$78,090)

Council replaced 9 light vehicles in this financial year (\$189,572)

Various repairs and maintenance carried out throughout the year with additional funds spent on the town garbage compactors which are at the end of their useful life. Council recently resolved to replace all 3 compactors which is currently in progress and should see Wilcannia, Ivanhoe and Menindee receive new units in March 2013.

Council purchased a new Hitachi five tone Excavator (\$81,400)

Payment of Expenses and Facilities to Councillors

COUNCIL MINUTE: 9-6-10

Background

Section 252 of the Local Government Act, 1993 requires Council to consider and adopt a policy on the payment of expenses and provision of facilities to Councillors within five months after the end of each year.

Objective

To ensure that Councillors and members of the public are aware of the payment of expenses and provision of facilities to Councillors.

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that there is accountability and transparency in the reimbursement of expenses incurred or to be incurred by the Councillors.

The policy also ensures that the facilities provided to assist and support the Councillors to carry out their civic functions are reasonable.

Application/Scope

This policy is to apply to the elected members, Councillors, of the Central Darling Shire Council.

Definitions

Not applicable.

Principles/Body

Payment of Councillor Fees

- 1. An annual fee is paid to each Councillor by the Council. The fee is the amount fixed by the Council under Division 5 of Part 2 of Chapter 9 of the Local Government Act, 1993 in accordance with the appropriate determination of the Local Government Remuneration Tribunal.
- Unless otherwise provided for in this policy. The annual fee paid to each Councillor is intended
 to offset the costs involved in discharging the functions of civic office including, but not limited
 to, all incidental and out-of-pocket expenses relating to transport, clothing, home office
 expenses, home telephone and postage costs.
- 3. All fees payable under this policy shall be paid within 10 working days of the date of the Council meeting and where no Council meeting is held will be paid in the third week of the month.
- 4. Unless otherwise stated, no entitlement under this policy shall be treated as being a private benefit that requires a reduction in the Councillor Fee.

Reimbursement and reconciliation of expenses

- 1. Reimbursement of costs and expenses to Councillors will only be made upon the production of appropriate receipts and tax invoices, and the completion of the "Central Darling Shire Council Expenses Claim Form". Expenses and costs incurred must be in accordance with the requirements of this policy. Where no receipts or tax invoices are submitted, a Councillor shall be required to sign a Statutory Declaration to confirm that the expense was incurred. If a Statutory Declaration is provided in lieu of receipts and tax invoices, Councillors are requested to personally retain any supporting documentation for audit purposes and shall be required to produce this documentation to Council upon request.
- 2. The Mayor or the General Manager as an alternate, shall assess all such claims and if considered reasonable and to be legitimately payable under this policy, shall approve the claim for payment and payment shall be made within 10 working days.
- 3. Should the Mayor or the General Manager as an alternate, decide that the claim should not be paid, an explanation of that decision shall be made to the Councillor concerned and should the Councillor still consider that the claim should be paid, it shall be considered that a dispute exists and the provisions of the Disputes clause of this policy shall apply.

Attendance at seminars, conferences and training courses

- Council approval is required for Councillors to attend seminars, conferences or training courses on behalf of the Council by way of a report to be included in the Council business papers. Any application to attend a seminar or conference will require full details of the purpose, expected total costs and expected benefits.
- 2. After returning from the seminar, conference or training course, the Councillor/s shall provide a written report to Council on the aspects of the event relevant to Council business and/or the local community. No written report is required for the Annual Conferences of the Local Government Shires Association or for compulsory training courses or seminars required by any Government agency.
- 3. Council will pay the seminar, conference or training course registration fees charged by the organizers including the costs of related official meals and associated tours where they are relevant to the business and interests of the Council. Any time and costs incurred in undertaking activities not related to attendance at the event shall not be included in the expenses paid by Council.
- 4. Council will also meet the reasonable cost of transportation and accommodation associated with attendance at the seminar, conference or training course, including the reasonable cost of meals (and reasonable cost of drinks) when they are not otherwise included in the fees.

Other conferences

1. Attendance at the Annual Local Government Shires Association conference is to be made up of the Mayor or nominated delegate and the General Manager.

- 2. Attendance at the Annual Western Division Shires Conference is available to the Mayor, General Manager and interested Councillors. A specific formal resolution is required to authorize the attendance of interested Councillors.
- 3. Attendance at Divisional meetings of the Local Government Shires Association is to be made up of the Mayor and the General Manager.
- 4. Attendance at the Annual Women's Association conference is available to interested Councillors, with a formal Council resolution required to authorize the attendance.
- 5. Should a Councillor fail to attend a conference, seminar or training course without the approval of the Mayor on extenuating circumstances then Council is to be reimbursed all costs incurred by the Council. Such payment is to be made by the Councillor concerned within 30 days of the cancellation of the conference, seminar or training course.

Spouse and partner expenses

A Councillors spouse or partner may attend any conference, seminar or training opportunity with all differential costs to be borne by the Councillor concerned.

Training and education expenses

- 1. An induction program shall be conducted by the General Manager for Councillors upon election and every subsequent re-election. This program may include the provision of resources and the attendance at training courses.
- 2. Provision of other training and education for Councillors will be made separately in Council's budget via the adopted Management Plan. All Councillors will be offered the same access to the same training in accordance with the budget allocated.
- 3. It is essential that the training and education is directly related to the Councillors civic functions and responsibilities.

General travel and accommodation arrangements

- 1. All travel by Councillors to a seminar, conference or training course shall be undertaken by utilizing the most direct route and the most practical and economical mode of transport subject to any personal medical considerations or extenuating circumstances.
- 2. Economy class air travel will be provided as standard for travel within Australia.
- 3. Where trains are used, first class train travel will be provided, including sleeping berths where available.
- 4. Council shall also meet the cost of any transfers between a Councillor's residence and a transport interchange (ie: airport) and between the transport interchange and hotel/motel or venue.
- 5. Council shall reimburse travel expenses to a seminar, conference or training course by a Councillor whilst using their own private vehicle by way of a reimbursement for each kilometre travelled for the specific journey, plus any road tolls and parking fees necessarily incurred. The rate of reimbursement for kilometres travelled shall be equivalent to the rates prescribed in the relevant legislation or policies applicable to

- employees of the Council. Council is not liable for any traffic, parking or transport fines, or costs of petrol, oil, depreciation, repair, maintenance, insurance or registration incurred by Councillors whilst using their private vehicles on Council related business.
- Any accommodation required by Councillors will be provided by Council subject to availability, access to venue and cost. A minimum standard of 3.5 stars is considered appropriate.

Local travel arrangements and expenses

- Each Councillor will be required to use their private vehicle to attend Council meetings.
 Where the meeting is to be held in Wilcannia, Councillors will be reimbursed for the use
 of their private vehicle. It should be noted that car pooling is to be encouraged in an
 attempt to minimise the cost associated with such meetings. Councillors will be
 reimbursed for the number of kilometres travelled over the shortest practical route
 from their principal place of residence to the meeting and return.
- 2. The rate per kilometre will be based on the Local Government (State) Award and will be dependent on the engine capacity of the vehicle. Councillors will be requested to complete a travel claim form and submit that to the Mayor for authorisation. Claims should be completed whilst attending the Council meeting and will be paid in the next practical pay period following the meeting.
- 3. Where a Councillor is travelling to a Council Meeting from a location outside the Shire boundaries, the travel claim will be restricted to the equivalent of travel allowance calculated on the distance travelled from the Shire boundary to the Meeting and return along the shortest possible route (weather permitting). In other cases, a Councillor will be entitled to the travel allowance calculated on the distance travelled from the Councillor's principal place of residence to the Council Meeting and return.
- 4. Where the Council meeting is held away from Wilcannia and staff will be in attendance, Councillors are encouraged to travel with a staff member to the meeting.
- 5. Councillors travelling to meetings of Council will be entitled to travel on the day preceding the meeting as well as the day of the meeting and stay in the township holding the meeting. Accommodation costs and reasonable meal expenses will be paid or reimbursed to the Councillor upon production of necessary documentation. Where the meeting is to held in Tilpa or White Cliffs, Councillors travelling from the southern part of the Shire will be entitled to be accommodated in Wilcannia on the evening preceding the meeting and arrange appropriate accommodation for the evening of the meeting. Again, accommodation costs and reasonable meal expenses will be paid or reimbursed.
- 6. In the instances of Councillors requiring accommodation appropriate booking arrangements should be made with the Administration Officer Reception.

Interstate or overseas travel

- Council approval is required for interstate or overseas travel for which reimbursement is sought by Councillors. Any travel proposals for Councillors to travel interstate or overseas requires to be included in the non-confidential business papers of Council for which due public notice has been given. Such proposals cannot be considered in a late report or Mayoral Minute.
- Any application for interstate or overseas travel will require full details of the travel including itinerary, expected total costs, reasons for the travel and expected benefits.
 Council does not allow the retrospective re-imbursement of such travel expenses so all expenses must be approved in advance.
- 3. After returning from interstate or overseas travel, the Councillor shall provide a written report to Council on the aspects of the trip relevant to Council business and/or the local community.

Insurance provisions and expenses

- 1. In accordance with Section 382 of the Local Government Act, Council is insured against public liability and professional indemnity claims up the value of \$400 million and \$300 million respectively. Councillors are included as a named insured on this Policy.
- 2. Councillors are provided liability protection by way of the Councillors and Officers Liability Policy, and personal injury protection by way of the Personal Accident Policy.
- 3. Insurance protection is only provided if a claim arises out of or in connection with the Councillor's performance of his or her civic duties or exercise of his or her functions as a Councillor. All insurances are subject to any limitations or conditions set out in the policies of insurance.
- 4. Council shall pay the insurance policy excess in respect of any claim accepted by Council's insurers, whether defended or not.

Mayoral fee

- 1. An annual fee is paid to the Mayor by the Council. The fee shall is the amount fixed by the Council under Division 5 of Part 2 of Chapter 9 of the Act in accordance with the appropriate determination of the Local Government Remuneration Tribunal.
- 2. Unless otherwise provided for in this Policy, the annual fee paid to the Mayor is intended to offset the additional costs involved in discharging the functions of the mayoral office over and above the costs incurred by other Councillors.
- 3. In the event that the Council resolves to pay an annual fee to the Deputy Mayor, the amount of such annual fee shall be deducted from the amount determined to be paid to the Mayor.
- 4. All fees payable under this policy shall be paid within 10 working days of the Council meeting or where a Council meeting is not held within three weeks of the month.
- 5. Unless otherwise stated, no entitlement under this Policy shall be treated as being a private benefit that requires a reduction in the Mayoral Fee.

Mayoral vehicle

- 1. The position of Mayor will be supplied with a fully maintained Council vehicle to an appropriate standard.
- 2. The vehicle is to be used for official purposes only and a detailed log book is to be kept at all times.

Communications

The Mayor is to be provided with a mobile phone for official Council business. No private usage is permitted, with Council to bear all costs.

Council delegate

- 1. Council formally resolves the issue of delegates to represent Council on various boards and committees at the September meeting of Council each year. This formal resolution constitutes the Council's authority for the individual Councillor to attend lawfully constituted meetings of the board or committee.
- 2. Travel arrangements should then be co-ordinated through the Administration Officer Reception, in accordance with this policy.

Legal assistance provisions and expenses

- 1. Council may, if requested, indemnify or reimburse the reasonable legal expenses of:
- a) A Councillor defending an action arising from the performance in good faith of a function under the Local Government Act, 1993; or
- b) A Councillor defending an action in defamation provided the statements complained of were made in good faith in the course of exercising a function under the Act; or
- c) A Councillor for proceedings before the Local Government Pecuniary Interest and Disciplinary Tribunal or an investigative body provided the subject of the proceedings arises from the performance in good faith of a function under the Act and the Tribunal or investigative body makes a finding substantially favourable to the Councillor.
 - 2. Legal expenses incurred in relation to proceedings arising out of the performance by a Councillor of his or her functions under the Act are distinguished from expenses incurred in relation to proceedings arising merely from something that a Councillor has done during his or her term in office. For example, expenses arising from an investigation as to whether a Councillor acted corruptly would not be covered by this section.
 - 3. Council will not meet the costs of an action in defamation taken by a Councillor as plaintiff in any circumstances and will not meet the costs of a Councillor seeking advice in respect of possible defamation, or in seeking a non-litigious remedy for possible defamation.
 - 4. The provisions of this section shall not apply in respect of any enquiry, investigation or hearing initiated at the request of, or to any legal proceedings taken by, the Council itself.

Incidential expenses

- 1. Council shall reimburse reasonable out of pocket or incidental expenses associated with attending conferences, seminars or training course incurred by Councillors.
- 2. Incidental expenses will only include reasonable telephone expenses.

Other facilities

- 1. Each Councillor shall be entitled to receive a chambray shirt and a polo shirt on an annual basis. These shirts shall have the official crest of the Council and shall be drawn from the annual supply provided to all staff.
- 2. In addition, each Councillor shall be entitled to a blazer with the appropriate Council crest attached to the front pocket.
- 3. Each Councillor will be provided with an official Council tie upon request.
- 4. All items of clothing remain the property of the individual Councillor, who will be responsible for the care and maintenance of the articles of clothing.
- 5. Each Councillor shall be entitled to a supply of business cards to the extent of 200 per year for the duration of their term, with costs to be borne by the Council.
- 6. In extra-ordinary circumstances a Councillor may claim reasonable costs of care arrangements. The Councillor seeking such reimbursement is to discuss and obtain the approval of the Mayor prior to the period of care. Such claims will only be considered in the most exceptional of cases.

Secretarial support

Secretarial support may be provided at the discretion of the General Manager for each Councillor at the Administration Building in Wilcannia, Rural Transaction Centre in Menindee and Multi Service Outlet in Ivanhoe. This may include typing, photocopying or use of a telephone. All expenses incurred including the cost of staff shall be met by the Council.

Delivery of material

At least monthly each Councillor may receive a delivery of material from Council including business papers, correspondence etc delivered to one property address nominated by the Councillor.

Disputes

Should any Councillor consider that a dispute exists at any time regarding this policy, the parties to the dispute shall provide a written report on the nature of the dispute and the General Manager shall submit such reports to the next meeting of the Council to have the dispute determined by a resolution of the Council having regard to this policy, the Act and any other relevant law. The decision of the Council shall be binding on all of the parties.

Breaches and Sanctions

• All difficulties will be dealt with in accordance with the disputes clause of this policy.

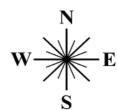

- (iv) These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Council on 18/12/12. Council has the power to amend and reissue the financial statements.

Understanding Council's Financial Statements

Introduction

Each year, individual Local Governments across NSW are required to present a set of audited Financial Statements to their Council & Community.

What you will find in the Statements

The Financial Statements set out the financial performance, financial position & cash flows of Council for the financial year ended 30 June 2012.

The format of the Financial Statements is standard across all NSW Councils and complies with both the accounting & reporting requirements of Australian Accounting Standards and requirements as set down by the NSW Division of Local Government.

About the Councillor/Management Statement

The Financial Statements must be certified by Senior staff as "presenting fairly" the Council's financial results for the year, and are required to be adopted by Council - ensuring both responsibility for & ownership of the Financial Statements.

About the Primary Financial Statements

The Financial Statements incorporate 5 "primary" financial statements:

1. An Income Statement

A summary of Council's financial performance for the year, listing all income & expenses.

This Statement also displays Council's original adopted budget to provide a comparison between what was projected and what actually occurred.

2. A Statement of Comprehensive Income

Primarily records changes in the fair values of Council's Infrastructure, Property, Plant & Equip.

3. A Balance Sheet

A 30 June snapshot of Council's Financial Position including its Assets & Liabilities.

4. A Statement of Changes in Equity

The overall change for the year (in dollars) of Council's "net wealth".

5. A Statement of Cash Flows

Indicates where Council's cash came from and where it was spent.

This Statement also displays Council's original adopted budget to provide a comparison between what was projected and what actually occurred.

About the Notes to the Financial Statements

The Notes to the Financial Statements provide greater detail and additional information on the 5 Primary Financial Statements.

About the Auditor's Reports

Council's Financial Statements are required to be audited by external accountants (that generally specialize in Local Government).

In NSW, the Auditor provides 2 audit reports:

- An opinion on whether the Financial Statements present fairly the Council's financial performance & position, &
- 2. Their observations on the conduct of the Audit including the Council's financial performance & financial position.

Who uses the Financial Statements?

The Financial Statements are publicly available documents & must be presented at a Council meeting between 7 days & 5 weeks after the date of the Audit Report.

Submissions from the public can be made to Council up to 7 days subsequent to the public presentation of the Financial Statements.

Council is required to forward an audited set of Financial Statements to the Division of Local Government.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted by Council in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements are set out below in order to assist in its general understanding.

Under Australian Accounting Standards (AASB's), accounting policies are defined as those specific principles, bases, conventions, rules and practices applied by a reporting entity (in this case Council) in preparing and presenting its financial statements.

(a) Basis of preparation

(i) Background

These financial statements are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with:

- Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board,
- the Local Government Act (1993) & Regulation, and
- the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting.

For the purpose of preparing these financial statements, Council has been deemed to be a not-for-profit entity.

(ii) Compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs)

Because Australian Accounting Standards (AASB's) are sector neutral, some standards either:

- (a) have local Australian content and prescription that is specific to the Not-For-Profit sector (including Local Government) which are not in compliance with IFRS's, or
- **(b)** specifically exclude application by Not for Profit entities.

Accordingly in preparing these financial statements and accompanying notes, Council has been unable to comply fully with International Accounting Standards, but has complied fully with Australian Accounting Standards.

Under the Local Government Act (LGA), Regulations and Local Government Code of Accounting Practice & Financial Reporting, it should be noted that Councils in NSW only have a requirement to comply with Australian Accounting Standards.

(iii) New and amended standards adopted by Council

None of the new standards and amendments to standards that are mandatory for the first time for the financial year beginning 1 July 2011 affected any of the amounts recognised in the current period or any prior period and are not likely to affect future periods.

(iv) Early adoption of Accounting Standards

Council has not elected to apply any pronouncements before their operative date in the annual reporting period beginning 1 July 2011.

Refer further to paragraph (ab) relating to a summary of the effects of Standards with future operative dates..

(v) Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared under the **historical cost convention** except for:

- (i) financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, available-for-sale financial assets and investment properties which are all valued at fair value,
- (ii) the write down of any Asset on the basis of Impairment (if warranted) and
- (iii) certain classes of Infrastructure, property, plant & equipment that are accounted for at fair valuation.

The accrual basis of accounting has also been applied in their preparation.

(vi) Changes in Accounting Policies

Council's accounting policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

There have also been no changes in accounting policies when compared with previous financial statements unless otherwise stated [refer Note 20(d)].

(vii) Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates (in conformity with AASB's).

Accordingly this requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Council's accounting policies.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

Council makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future.

The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results.

The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are set out below.

- (i) Estimated fair values of investment properties
- (ii) Estimated fair values of infrastructure, property, plant and equipment.
- (iii) Estimated tip remediation provisions.

(b) Revenue recognition

Council recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity and specific criteria have been met for each of the Council's activities as described below.

Council bases any estimates on historical results, taking into consideration the type of customer, the type of transaction and the specifics of each arrangement.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Revenue is measured on major income categories as follows:

Rates, Annual Charges, Grants and Contributions

Rates, annual charges, grants and contributions (including developer contributions) are recognised as revenues when the Council obtains control over the assets comprising these receipts.

Control over assets acquired from rates and annual charges is obtained at the commencement of the rating year as it is an enforceable debt linked to the rateable property or, where earlier, upon receipt of the rates.

A provision for the impairment on rates receivables has not been established as unpaid rates represent a charge against the rateable property that will be recovered when the property is next sold.

Control over granted assets is normally obtained upon their receipt (or acquittal) or upon earlier notification that a grant has been secured, and is valued at their fair value at the date of transfer.

Revenue from Contributions is recognised when the Council either obtains control of the contribution or the right to receive it, (i) it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the contribution will flow to the Council and (ii) the amount of the contribution can be measured reliably.

Where grants or contributions recognised as revenues during the financial year were obtained on condition that they be expended in a particular manner or used over a particular period and those conditions were undischarged at balance date, the unused grant or contribution is disclosed in Note 3(g).

Note 3(g) also discloses the amount of unused grant or contribution from prior years that was expended on Council's operations during the current year.

The Council has obligations to provide facilities from contribution revenues levied on developers under the provisions of S94 of the EPA Act 1979.

Whilst Council generally incorporates these amounts as part of a Development Consents Order, such developer contributions are only recognised as income upon their physical receipt by Council, due to the possibility that individual Development Consents

may not be acted upon by the applicant and accordingly would not be payable to Council.

Developer contributions may only be expended for the purposes for which the contributions were required but the Council may apply contributions according to the priorities established in work schedules.

A detailed Note relating to developer contributions can be found at Note 17.

User Charges, Fees and Other Income

User charges, fees and other income (including fines) are recognised as revenue when the service has been provided, the payment is received, or when the penalty has been applied, whichever first occurs.

A provision for the impairment of these receivables is recognised when collection in full is no longer probable.

A liability is recognised in respect of revenue that is reciprocal in nature to the extent that the requisite service has not been provided as at balance date.

Sale of Infrastructure, Property, Plant and Equipment

The profit or loss on sale of an asset is determined when control of the asset has irrevocably passed to the buyer.

Interest and Rents

Rents are recognised as revenue on a proportional basis when the payment is due, the value of the payment is notified, or the payment is received, whichever first occurs.

Interest Income from Cash & Investments is accounted for using the Effective Interest method in accordance with AASB 139.

(c) Principles of Consolidation

These financial statements incorporate (i) the assets and liabilities of Council and any Entities (or operations) that it **controls** (as at 30/6/12) and (ii) all the related operating results (for the financial year ended the 30th June 2012).

In the process of reporting on Council's activities as a single unit, all inter-entity year end balances and reporting period transactions have been eliminated in full between Council and its controlled entities.

(i) The Consolidated Fund

In accordance with the provisions of Section 409(1) of the LGA 1993, all money and property received by Council is held in the Council's Consolidated Fund unless it is required to be held in the Council's Trust Fund.

The Consolidated Fund and other entities through which the Council controls resources to carry on its functions have been included in the financial statements forming part of this report.

The following entities have been included as part of the Consolidated Fund:

- General Purpose Operations
- Water Supply
- Sewerage Service
- Other

(ii) The Trust Fund

In accordance with the provisions of Section 411 of the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended), a separate and distinct Trust Fund is maintained to account for all money and property received by the Council in trust which must be applied only for the purposes of or in accordance with the trusts relating to those monies.

Trust monies and property subject to Council's control have been included in these statements.

Trust monies and property held by Council but not subject to the control of Council, have been excluded from these statements.

A separate statement of monies held in the Trust Fund is available for inspection at the Council office by any person free of charge.

(iii) Joint Ventures

Council has no interest in any Joint Venture Entities, Assets or Operations.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(iv) County Councils

Council is not a member of any County Councils.

(d) Leases

All Leases entered into by Council are reviewed and classified on inception date as either a Finance Lease or an Operating Lease.

Finance Leases

Leases of property, plant and equipment where the Council has substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised at the lease's inception at the lower of the fair value of the leased property and the present value of the minimum lease payments.

The corresponding rental obligations, net of finance charges, are included in borrowings.

Each lease payment is allocated between the liability outstanding and the recognition of a finance charge.

The interest element of the finance charge is costed to the income statement over the lease period so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for each period.

Property, plant and equipment acquired under finance leases is depreciated over the shorter of each leased asset's useful life and the lease term.

Operating Leases

Leases in which a significant portion of the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases.

Payments made under operating leases (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are charged to the income statement on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Lease income from operating leases is recognised in income on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes;

- cash on hand,
- deposits held at call with financial institutions,
- other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and
- bank overdrafts.

Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet but are incorporated into Cash & Cash Equivalents for presentation of the Cash Flow Statement.

(f) Investments and Other Financial Assets

Council (in accordance with AASB 139) classifies each of its investments into one of the following categories for measurement purposes:

- financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.
- loans and receivables,
- held-to-maturity investments, and
- available-for-sale financial assets.

Each classification depends on the purpose/intention for which the investment was acquired & at the time it was acquired.

Management determines each Investment classification at the time of initial recognition and reevaluates this designation at each reporting date.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss include financial assets that are "held for trading".

A financial asset is classified in the "held for trading" category if it is acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the short term.

Notes to the Financial Statements

for the financial year ended 30 June 2012

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Assets in this category are primarily classified as current assets as they are primarily held for trading &/or are expected to be realised within 12 months of the balance sheet date.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market.

They arise when the Council provides money, goods or services directly to a debtor with no intention (or in some cases ability) of selling the resulting receivable.

They are included in current assets, except for those with maturities greater than 12 months after the balance sheet date which are classified as non-current assets.

(iii) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities that the Council's management has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity.

In contrast to the "Loans & Receivables" classification, these investments are generally quoted in an active market.

Held-to-maturity financial assets are included in noncurrent assets, except for those with maturities less than 12 months from the reporting date, which are classified as current assets.

(iv) Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are nonderivatives that are either designated in this category or not classified in any of the other categories.

Investments must be designated as available-forsale if they do not have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments and management intends to hold them for the medium to long term.

Accordingly, this classification principally comprises marketable equity securities, but can include all types of financial assets that could otherwise be classified in one of the other investment categories.

They are generally included in non-current assets unless management intends to dispose of the investment within 12 months of the balance sheet date or the term to maturity from the reporting date is less than 12 months.

General Accounting & Measurement of Financial Instruments:

(i) Initial Recognition

Investments are initially recognised (and measured) at fair value, plus in the case of investments not at "fair value through profit or loss", directly attributable transactions costs

Purchases and sales of investments are recognised on trade-date - the date on which the Council commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Council has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

(ii) Subsequent Measurement

Available-for-sale financial assets and financial assets at fair value through profit and loss are subsequently carried at fair value.

Loans and receivables and held-to-maturity investments are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Realised and unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets classified as "fair value through profit or loss" category are included in the income statement in the period in which they arise.

Unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of non monetary securities classified as "available-for-sale" are recognised in equity in the available-for-sale investments revaluation reserve.

When securities classified as "available-for-sale" are sold or impaired, the accumulated fair value adjustments are included in the income statement as gains and losses from investment securities.

Impairment

Council assesses at each balance date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired.

A financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired and impairment losses are incurred only if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (a 'loss event') and that loss event (or events) has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset or group of financial assets that can be reliably estimated.

(iii) Types of Investments

Council has an approved Investment Policy in order to undertake its investment of money in accordance with (and to comply with) Section 625 of the Local Government Act and S212 of the LG (General) Regulation 2005.

Investments are placed and managed in accordance with the Policy and having particular regard to authorised investments prescribed under the Ministerial Local Government Investment Order.

Council maintains its investment Policy in compliance with the Act and ensures that it or its representatives exercise care, diligence and skill that a prudent person would exercise in investing Council funds.

Council amended its policy following revisions to the Ministerial Local Government Investment Order arising from the Cole Inquiry recommendations. Certain investments that Council holds are no longer prescribed (e.g. managed funds, CDOs, and equity linked notes), however they have been retained under grandfathering provisions of the Order. These will be disposed of when most financially advantageous to Council.

(g) Fair value estimation

The fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities must be estimated for recognition and measurement or for disclosure purposes.

The fair value of financial instruments traded in active markets is based on quoted market prices at the balance sheet date.

The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques.

Council uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each balance date.

Quoted market prices or dealer quotes for similar instruments are used for long-term debt instruments held.

If the market for a financial asset is not active (and for unlisted securities), the Council establishes fair value by using valuation techniques.

These include reference to the fair values of recent arm's length transactions, involving the same instruments or other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, and option pricing models refined to reflect the issuer's specific circumstances.

The nominal value less estimated credit adjustments of trade receivables and payables are assumed to approximate their fair values.

The fair value of financial liabilities for disclosure purposes is estimated by discounting the future contractual cash flows at the current market interest rate that is available to the Council for similar financial instruments.

(h) Receivables

Receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost, less any provision for impairment.

Receivables (excluding Rates & Annual Charges) are generally due for settlement no more than 30 days from the date of recognition.

The collectibility of receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off in accordance with Council's policy.

A provision for impairment (ie. an allowance account) relating to receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the Council will not be able to

collect all amounts due according to the original terms of each receivable.

The amount of the provision is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the effective interest rate.

Impairment losses are recognised in the Income Statement within other expenses.

When a receivable for which an impairment allowance had been recognised becomes uncollectible in a subsequent period, it is written off against the allowance account.

Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in the income statement.

(i) Inventories

Raw Materials and Stores, Work in Progress and Finished Goods

Raw materials and stores, work in progress and finished goods in respect of business undertakings are all stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Cost comprises direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenditure, the latter being allocated on the basis of normal operating capacity.

Costs are assigned to individual items of inventory on the basis of weighted average costs.

Inventories held in respect of non-business undertakings have been valued at cost subject to adjustment for loss of service potential.

Land Held for Resale/Capitalisation of Borrowing Costs

Land held for resale is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Cost is assigned by specific identification and includes the cost of acquisition, and development and borrowing costs during development.

When development is completed borrowing costs and other holding charges are expensed as incurred.

Borrowing costs included in the cost of land held for resale are those costs that would have been avoided if the expenditure on the acquisition and development of the land had not been made.

Borrowing costs incurred while active development is interrupted for extended periods are recognised as expenses.

(j) Infrastructure, Property, Plant and Equipment (I,PP&E)

Acquisition of assets

Council's non current assets have been progressively revalued to fair value in accordance with a staged implementation as advised by the Division of Local Government.

At balance date, the following classes of I,PP&E were stated at their Fair Value;

- Investment Properties refer Note 1(p),
- Water and Sewerage Networks (Internal Valuation)
- Operational Land (Internal Valuation)
- Buildings Specialised/Non Specialised (Internal Valuation)
- Plant and Equipment

(as approximated by depreciated historical cost)

- Roads Assets incl. roads, bridges & footpaths (Internal Valuation)
- Drainage Assets (Internal Valuation)
- Bulk Earthworks (Internal Valuation)
- Community Land (Internal Valuation)
- Land Improvements

- Other Structures

(as approximated by depreciated historical cost)

- Other Assets

(as approximated by depreciated historical cost)

Initial Recognition

On initial recognition, an assets cost is measured at its fair value, plus all expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition.

Where settlement of any part of an asset's cash consideration is deferred, the amounts payable in the future are discounted to their present value as at the date of recognition (ie. date of exchange) of the asset to arrive at fair value.

The discount rate used is the Council's incremental borrowing rate, being the rate at which a similar borrowing could be obtained from an independent financier under comparable terms and conditions.

Where infrastructure, property, plant and equipment assets are acquired for no cost or for an amount other than cost, the assets are recognised in the financial statements at their fair value at acquisition date - being the amount that the asset could have been exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction.

Subsequent costs

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to Council and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the income statement during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Asset Revaluations (including Indexation)

In accounting for Asset Revaluations relating to Infrastructure, Property, Plant & Equipment:

- Increases in the carrying amounts arising on revaluation are credited to the asset revaluation reserve.
- To the extent that the increase reverses a decrease previously recognised via the profit or loss, then increase is first recognised in profit or loss.
- Decreases that reverse previous increases of the same asset are first charged against revaluation reserves directly in equity to the extent of the

remaining reserve attributable to the asset, with all other decreases charged to the Income statement.

Council assesses at each reporting date whether there is any indication that a revalued asset's carrying amount may differ materially from that which would be determined if the asset were revalued at the reporting date.

If any such indication exists, Council determines the asset's fair value and revalues the asset to that amount.

Full revaluations are undertaken for all assets on a 5 vear cycle.

Capitalisation Thresholds

Items of infrastructure, property, plant and equipment are not capitalised unless their cost of acquisition exceeds the following;

All asset residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted (where appropriate), at each balance sheet date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount – refer Note 1(s) on Asset Impairment.

Disposal and De-recognition

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal.

Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in Council's Income Statement in the year the asset is derecognised.

(k) Land

Land (other than Land under Roads) is in accordance with Part 2 of Chapter 6 of the Local Government Act (1993) classified as either Operational or Community.

This classification of Land is disclosed in Note 9(a).

(I) Land under roads

Land under roads is land under roadways and road reserves including land under footpaths, nature strips and median strips.

Council has elected to recognise land under roads acquired before 1 July 2008 in accordance with AASB 1051.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Land under roads acquired after 1 July 2008 is recognised in accordance with AASB 116 – Property, Plant and Equipment.

(m) Intangible Assets

Council has not classified any assets as Intangible.

(n) Crown Reserves

Crown Reserves under Council's care and control are recognised as assets of the Council.

While ownership of the reserves remains with the Crown, Council retains operational control of the reserves and is responsible for their maintenance and use in accordance with the specific purposes to which the reserves are dedicated.

Improvements on Crown Reserves are also recorded as assets, while maintenance costs incurred by Council and revenues relating the reserves are recognised within Council's Income Statement.

Representations are currently being sought across State and Local Government to develop a consistent accounting treatment for Crown Reserves across both tiers of government.

(o) Rural Fire Service assets

Under section 119 of the Rural Fires Act 1997, "all fire fighting equipment purchased or constructed wholly or from money to the credit of the Fund is to be vested in the council of the area for or on behalf of which the fire fighting equipment has been purchased or constructed".

At present, the accounting for such fire fighting equipment is not treated in a consistent manner across all Councils.

Until such time as discussions on this matter have concluded and the legislation changed, Council will continue to account for these assets as it has been doing in previous years, which is to include the assets, their values and depreciation charges within these financial statements.

(p) Investment property

Investment property comprises land &/or buildings that are principally held for long-term rental yields, capital gains or both that is not occupied by Council.

Investment property is carried at fair value, representing an in-house valuation based on a discounted cash flow analysis.

Annual changes in the fair value of Investment Properties are recorded in the Income Statement as part of "Other Income".

Full revaluations are carried out every three years.

(q) Provisions for close down, restoration and for environmental clean up costs – including Tips and Quarries

Close down, Restoration and Remediation costs include the dismantling and demolition of infrastructure, the removal of residual materials and the remediation of disturbed areas.

Estimated close down and restoration costs are provided for in the accounting period when the obligation arising from the related disturbance occurs, whether this occurs during the development or during the operation phase, based on the net present value of estimated future costs.

Provisions for close down and restoration costs do not include any additional obligations which are expected to arise from future disturbance.

Costs are estimated on the basis of a closure plan.

The cost estimates are calculated annually during the life of the operation to reflect known developments, eg updated cost estimates and revisions to the estimated lives of operations, and are subject to formal review at regular intervals.

Close down, Restoration and Remediation costs are a normal consequence of tip and quarry operations, and the majority of close down and restoration expenditure is incurred at the end of the life of the operations.

Although the ultimate cost to be incurred is uncertain, Council estimates the respective costs based on

feasibility and engineering studies using current restoration standards and techniques.

The amortisation or 'unwinding' of the discount applied in establishing the net present value of provisions is charged to the income statement in each accounting period.

This amortisation of the discount is disclosed as a borrowing cost in Note 4(b).

Other movements in the provisions for Close down, Restoration and Remediation costs including those resulting from new disturbance, updated cost estimates, changes to the estimated lives of operations and revisions to discount rates are capitalised within property, plant and equipment.

These costs are then depreciated over the lives of the assets to which they relate.

Where rehabilitation is conducted systematically over the life of the operation, rather than at the time of closure, provision is made for the estimated outstanding continuous rehabilitation work at each balance sheet date and the cost is charged to the income statement.

Provision is made for the estimated present value of the costs of environmental clean up obligations outstanding at the balance sheet date.

These costs are charged to the income statement.

Movements in the environmental clean up provisions are presented as an operating cost, except for the unwind of the discount which is shown as a borrowing cost.

Remediation procedures generally commence soon after the time the damage, remediation process and estimated remediation costs become known, but may continue for many years depending on the nature of the disturbance and the remediation techniques.

As noted above, the ultimate cost of environmental remediation is uncertain and cost estimates can vary in response to many factors including changes to the relevant legal requirements, the emergence of new restoration techniques or experience at other locations.

The expected timing of expenditure can also change, for example in response to changes in quarry reserves or production rates.

As a result there could be significant adjustments to the provision for close down and restoration and environmental clean up, which would affect future financial results.

Specific Information relating to Council's provisions relating to Close down, Restoration and Remediation costs can be found at Note 26.

(r) Impairment of assets

All Council's I,PP&E is subject to an annual assessment of impairment.

Assets that are subject to amortisation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable.

An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use.

For non-cash generating assets of Council such as roads, drains, public buildings etc - value in use is represented by the "deprival value" of the asset which is approximated as its written down replacement cost.

Other assets are tested for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable.

Goodwill & other Intangible Assets that have an indefinite useful life and are not subject to amortisation are tested annually for impairment.

(s) Payables

These amounts represent liabilities and include goods and services provided to the Council prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid.

The amounts for goods and services are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(t) Borrowings

Borrowings are initially recognised at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred.

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Borrowings are removed from the balance sheet when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Council has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the balance sheet date.

(u) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs are expensed.

(v) Provisions

Provisions for legal claims, service warranties and other like liabilities are recognised when:

- Council has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events;
- it is more likely than not that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; and
- the amount has been reliably estimated.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole.

A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the reporting date.

The discount rate used to determine the present value reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

(w) Employee benefits

(i) Short Term Obligations

Short term employee benefit obligations include liabilities for wages and salaries (including non-monetary benefits), annual leave and vesting sick leave expected to be settled within the 12 months after the reporting period.

Leave liabilities are recognised in the provision for employee benefits in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date with other short term employee benefit obligations disclosed under payables.

These provisions are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Liabilities for non vesting sick leave are recognised at the time when the leave is taken and measured at the rates paid or payable, and accordingly no Liability has been recognised in these reports.

Wages & salaries, annual leave and vesting sick leave are all classified as Current Liabilities.

(ii) Other Long Term Obligations

The liability for all long service and annual leave in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date (which is not expected to be settled within the 12 months after the reporting period) are recognised in the provision for employee benefits.

These liabilities are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made using the projected unit credit method.

Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service.

Expected future payments are then discounted using market yields at the reporting date based on national

government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match as closely as possible the estimated future cash outflows.

Due to the nature of when and how Long Service Leave can be taken, all Long Service Leave for employees with 4 or more years of service has been classified as Current, as it has been deemed that Council does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months – even though it is not anticipated that all employees with more than 4 years service (as at reporting date) will apply for and take their leave entitlements in the next 12 months.

(iii) Retirement benefit obligations

All employees of the Council are entitled to benefits on retirement, disability or death.

Council contributes to various defined benefit plans and defined contribution plans on behalf of its employees.

Defined Benefit Plans

A liability or asset in respect of defined benefit superannuation plans would ordinarily be recognised in the balance sheet, and measured as the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date plus unrecognised actuarial gains (less unrecognised actuarial losses) less the fair value of the superannuation fund's assets at that date and any unrecognised past service cost.

The present value of the defined benefit obligation is based on expected future payments which arise from membership of the fund to the reporting date, calculated annually by independent actuaries using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service.

However, when this information is not reliably available, Council can account for its obligations to defined benefit plans on the same basis as its obligations to defined contribution plans – i.e. as an expense when they become payable.

Council is party to an Industry Defined Benefit Plan under the Local Government Superannuation Scheme, named the "Local Government Superannuation Scheme – Pool B" This Scheme has been deemed to be a "multi employer fund" for the purposes of AASB 119.

Sufficient information is not available to account for the Scheme as a defined benefit plan (in accordance with AASB 119) because the assets to the scheme are pooled together for all Councils.

Accordingly, Council's contributions to the scheme for the current reporting year have been recognised as an expense and disclosed as part of Superannuation Expenses at Note 4(a).

The Local Government Superannuation Scheme has advised member councils that, as a result of the global financial crisis, it has a significant deficiency of assets over liabilities.

As a result, they have asked for significant increases in future contributions to recover that deficiency.

Council's share of that deficiency cannot be accurately calculated as the Scheme is a mutual arrangement where assets and liabilities are pooled together for all member councils.

For this reason, no liability for the deficiency has been recognised in these financial statements.

Council has, however, disclosed a contingent liability in note 18 to reflect the possible obligation that may arise should the Scheme require immediate payment to correct the deficiency.

Defined Contribution Plans

Contributions to Defined Contribution Plans are recognised as an expense as they become payable. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or a reduction in the future payments is available.

(iv) Employee Benefit On-Costs

Council has recognised at year end the aggregate on-cost liabilities arising from employee benefits, and in particular those on-cost liabilities that will arise when payment of current employee benefits is made in future periods.

These amounts include Superannuation and Workers Compensation expenses which will be payable upon the future payment of certain Leave Liabilities accrued as at 30/6/12.

(x) Self insurance

Council does not self insure.

(y) Allocation between current and non-current assets & liabilities

In the determination of whether an asset or liability is classified as current or non-current, consideration is given to the time when each asset or liability is expected to be settled.

The asset or liability is classified as current if it is expected to be settled within the next 12 months, being the Council's operational cycle.

Exceptions

In the case of liabilities where Council does not have the unconditional right to defer settlement beyond 12 months (such as vested long service leave), the liability is classified as current even if not expected to be settled within the next 12 months.

In the case of inventories that are "held for trading", these are also classified as current even if not expected to be realised in the next 12 months.

(z) Taxes

The Council is exempt from both Commonwealth Income Tax and Capital Gains Tax.

Council does however have to comply with both Fringe Benefits Tax and Goods and Services Tax (GST).

Goods & Services Tax (GST)

Income, expenses and assets are all recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the revenue / expense.

Receivables and payables within the Balance Sheet are stated inclusive of any applicable GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from or payable to the ATO is included as a current asset or current liability in the Balance Sheet.

Operating cash flows within the Cash Flow Statement are on a gross basis, ie. they are inclusive of GST where applicable.

Investing and Financing cash flows are treated on a net basis (where recoverable form the ATO), ie. they are exclusive of GST. Instead, the GST component of investing and financing activity cash flows which are recoverable from or payable to the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from (or payable to) the ATO.

(aa) New accounting standards and UIG interpretations

Certain new (or amended) accounting standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for reporting periods ending 30 June 2012.

Council has not adopted any of these standards early.

Council's assessment of the impact of these new standards and interpretations is set out below.

Applicable to Local Government with implications:

AASB 9 Financial Instruments, AASB 2009 11 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9 and AASB 2010-7 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9 (December 2010) (effective from 1 January 2013)

AASB 9 Financial Instruments addresses the classification, measurement and derecognition of financial assets and financial liabilities.

The standard is not applicable until 1 January 2013 but is available for early adoption.

When adopted, the standard will affect in particular the Council's accounting for its available-for-sale financial assets, since AASB 9 only permits the

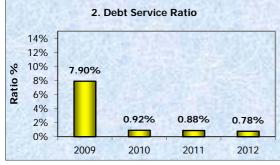

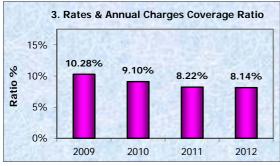

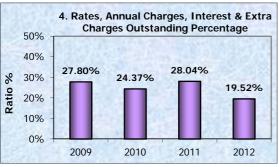

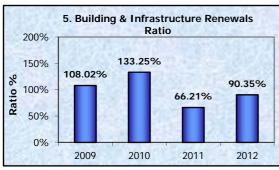

Risk Management

Council's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks including (1) price risk, (2) credit risk, (3) liquidity risk and (4) interest rate risk.

The Council's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Council.

Council does not engage in transactions expressed in foreign currencies and is therefore not subject to foreign currency risk.

Financial risk management is carried out by Council's Finance Section under policies approved by the Council.

(a) Cash & Cash Equivalents, Financial assets 'at fair value through the profit & Loss', "Available-for-sale" financial assets & "Held-to-maturity" Investments

Council's objective is to maximise its return on cash & investments whilst maintaining an adequate level of liquidity and preserving capital.

Council's Finance area manages the Cash & Investments portfolio with the assistance of independent advisors.

Council has an Investment Policy which complies with the Local Government Act & Minister's Investment Order. This Policy is regularly reviewed by Council and it's staff and an Investment Report is tabled before Council on a monthly basis setting out the portfolio breakup and its performance.

The major risk associated with Investments is price risk - the risk that the capital value of Investments may fluctuate due to changes in market prices, whether there changes are caused by factors specific to individual financial instruments or their issuers or are caused by factors affecting similar instruments traded in a market.

Cash & Investments are also subject to interest rate risk - the risk that movements in interest rates could affect returns and income.

A further risk associated with Cash & Investments is credit risk - the risk that the investment counterparty) will not complete their obligations particular to a financial instrument, resulting in a financial loss to Council - be it of a capital or income nature.

Council manages these risks (amongst other measures) by diversifying its portfolio and only purchasing investments with high credit ratings or capital guarantees.

Council also seeks advice from independent advisers before placing any funds in Cash Equivalents & Investments.

The following represents a summary of the sensitivity of Council's Income Statement and Accumulated Surplus (for the reporting period) due to a change in either the price of a financial asset or the interest rates applicable.

(b) Receivables

Council's major receivables comprise (i) Rates & Annual charges and (ii) User Charges & Fees.

The major risk associated with these receivables is credit risk - the risk that debts due and payable to Council may not be repaid in full.

Council manages this risk by monitoring outstanding debt and employing stringent debt recovery procedures. It also encourages ratepayers to pay their rates by the due date through incentives.

Credit risk on rates and annual charges is minimised by the ability of Council to secure a charge over the land relating to the debts - that is, the land can be sold to recover the debt. Council is also able to charge interest on overdue rates & annual charges at higher than market rates which further encourages the payment of debt.

There are no significant concentrations of credit risk, whether through exposure to individual customers, specific industry sectors and/or regions.

The level of outstanding receivables is reported to Council monthly and benchmarks are set and monitored for acceptable collection performance.

Council makes suitable provision for doubtful receivables as required and carries out credit checks on most non-rate debtors.

There are no material receivables that have been subjected to a re-negotiation of repayment terms.

Council participates in an employer sponsored Defined Benefit Superannuation Scheme, and makes contributions as determined by the Superannuation Scheme's Trustees.

Member Councils bear responsibility of ensuring there are sufficient funds available to pay out the required benefits as they fall due.

The Schemes most recent full actuarial review indicated that the Net Assets of the Scheme were not sufficient to meet the accrued benefits of the Schemes Defined Benefit member category with member Councils required to make significantly higher contributions in future years.

The Local Government Superannuation Scheme however is unable to provide Council with an accurate estimate of its share of the net deficit and accordingly Council has not recorded any net liability from it's Defined Benefit Scheme obligations in accordance with AASB 119.

Future contributions made to the defined benefit scheme to rectify the net deficit position will be recognised as an expense when they become payable - similar to the accounting for Defined Contributions Plans.

(ii) Statewide Limited

Council is a member of Statewide Mutual, a mutual pool scheme providing liability insurance to Local Government.

Membership includes the potential to share in either the net assets or liabilities of the fund depending on its past performance. Council's share of the Net Assets or Liabilities reflects Councils contributions to the pool and the result of insurance claims within each of the Fund Years.

The future realisation and finalisation of claims incurred but not reported to 30/6 this year may result in future liabilities or benefits as a result of past events that Council will be required to fund or share in respectively.

(iii) StateCover Limited

Council is a member of StateCover Mutual Limited and holds a partly paid share in the entity.

StateCover is a company providing workers compensation insurance cover to the NSW Local Government Industry and specifically Council.

Council has a contingent liability to contribute further equity in the event of the erosion of the Company's capital base as a result of the company's past performance and/or claims experience or as a result of any increased prudential requirements from APRA.

These future equity contributions would be required to maintain the company's minimum level of Net Assets in accordance with its Licence Requirements.

(iv) Other Guarantees

Council has provided no other Guarantees other than those listed above.

2. Other Liabilities

(i) Third Party Claims

The Council is involved from time to time in various claims incidental to the ordinary course of business including claims for damages relating to its services.

Council believes that it is appropriately covered for all claims through its Insurance Coverage and does not expect any material liabilities to eventuate.

(ii) S94 Plans

Council levies Section 94/94A Contributions upon various development across the Council area through the required Contributions Plans.

As part of these Plans, Council has received funds for which it will be required to expend the monies in accordance with those Plans.

As well, these Plans indicate proposed future expenditure to be undertaken by Council, which will be funded by making levies and receipting funds in future years or where a shortfall exists by the use of Council's General Funds.

These future expenses do not yet qualify as liabilities as of the Reporting Date, but represent Councils intention to spend funds in the manner and timing set out in those Plans.

(iii) Potential Land Acquisitions due to Planning Restrictions imposed by Council

Council has classified a number of privately owned land parcels as Local Open Space or Bushland.

As a result, where notified in writing by the various owners, Council will be required to purchase these land parcels.

At reporting date, reliable estimates as to the value of any potential liability (& subsequent land asset) from such potential acquisitions has not been possible.

ASSETS NOT RECOGNISED:

(i) Land Under Roads

As permitted under AASB 1051, Council has elected not to bring to account Land Under Roads that it owned or controlled up to & including 30/6/08.

(ii) Infringement Notices/Fines

Fines & Penalty Income, the result of Council issuing Infringement Notices is followed up and collected by the Infringement Processing Bureau.

Councils Revenue Recognition policy for such income is to account for it as revenue on receipt.

Accordingly, at Year End, there is a potential asset due to Council representing issued but unpaid Infringement Notices.

Due to the limited information available on the status, value and duration of outstanding Notices, Council is unable to determine the value of outstanding income.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE GENERAL PURPOSE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF CENTRAL DARLING SHIRE COUNCIL

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of Central Darling Shire Council for the financial year ended 30 June 2012. The financial Statements comprise the Statement by Council, Income Statement, Statement of Comprehensive Income, Balance Sheet, Statement of Changes in Equity, Statement of Cash Flows and accompanying Notes to the Financial Statements. Our audit responsibility does not extend to the original budget figures included in the Income Statement and Statement of Cash Flows, the original budget disclosures in Notes 2(a) and 16, and accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

Council's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Council is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the Local Government Act 1993. This responsibility includes establishing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. These Auditing Standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by Council, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Independence

In conducting our audit, we followed applicable independence requirements of Australian professional ethical pronouncements.

Matters Relating to the Electronic Presentation of the Audited Financial Statements

This auditor's report relates to the financial statements of Central Darling Shire Council for the year ended 30 June 2012 included on Council's web site. Council is responsible for the integrity of Council's web site. We have not been engaged to report on the integrity of the web site. The auditor's report refers only to the statements named above. It does not provide an opinion on any other information which may have been hyperlinked to/from these statements. If users of this report are concerned with the inherent risks arising from electronic data communications they are advised to refer to the hard copy of the audited financial





statements to confirm the information included in the audited financial statements presented on this web site.

Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion

Since July 2007, global financial markets have experienced a period of high volatility led by events in the US housing market, particularly sub prime loans, which has impacted the value, recoverability, liquidity, cash flows and rates of return of many financial assets including Collateralised Debt Obligations (CDO's), Equity Linked Notes (ELN's) and certain other Managed Funds.

As at 30 June 2012, Central Darling Shire Council's investment portfolio totalled \$2,934,000 and included securities totalling \$1,084,000 that have been impacted by this market volatility. The impact on individual securities varies depending on their degree of exposed to affected markets.

Many of these securities do not have market values that are independently quoted and they are not widely traded. Independent market valuations are not readily available and in many cases, values are assessed based on estimates from issuers and/or evaluation models for which there is limited market evidence available to verify their reasonableness. Further, the ongoing volatility of financial markets creates greater uncertainty to the valuation process.

These circumstances have resulted in our inability to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to satisfy ourselves as to the fair value and recoverability of \$1,084,000 of Council's total investment portfolio.

Qualified Audit Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects on the financial statements of the matter referred to in the paragraph above titled Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion,

- (a) the Council's accounting records have been kept in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Act 1993, Chapter 13, Part 3, Division 2;
- (b) the Council's financial statements:
 - (i) have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of this Division;
 - (ii) are consistent with the Council's accounting records;
 - (iii) presents fairly the Council's financial position, the results of its operations and cashflows; and
 - (iv) are in accordance with applicable Australian Accounting Standards, and other mandatory professional reporting requirements.
- (c) all information relevant to the conduct of the audit has been obtained; and
- (d) there are no material deficiencies in the accounting records or financial statements that have come to light in the course of the audit.

Application of the requirements of section 416 of the Local Government Act 1993.

Without further qualification to the opinion expressed above, attention is drawn to the date of issue of the financial statements. We note that the financial statements have not been completed within four months of the end of the financial year, as required by section 416 (5).

Accordingly this aspect of the financial statements does not comply with the Local Government Act 1993, Chapter 13, Part 3, Division 2.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE CONDUCT OF THE AUDIT – Section 417(3) CENTRAL DARLING SHIRE COUNCIL

We advise having completed our audit of the financial statements of Central Darling Shire Council for the financial year ended 30 June 2012. The financial statements include the general purpose consolidated accounts of the economic entity comprising the Council and its controlled entities and the special purpose financial statements, detailing the income and expenditure of Council's business units and their financial position at reporting date. The contents of both of these statements include the Council's Certificate as required by section 413(2)(c) of the Local Government Act 1993. The Council is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements and the information they contain. Our audit resulted in the issuing of a qualified audit report for the general purpose financial statements and an unqualified audit report for the special purpose financial statements of Council.

In accordance with Section 417 of the Local Government Act 1993 we submit our report on the conduct of the audit of Central Darling Shire Council for the year ended 30 June 2012. Our audit reports on the general purpose financial statements of Council and the special purpose financial statements on Council's business units outline the legislative framework of our audit and should be referred to in order to establish the context in which our comments are made.

Council's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Council is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the Local Government Act 1993. This responsibility includes establishing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. These Auditing Standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by Council, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.





We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

The following comments are provided in accordance with Section 415(3) of the Local Government Act 1993 and Regulation 227 of the Local Government (general) Regulation 2005 to assist in the understanding of the financial statements and our reports.

Review of the Financial Statements

(a) Result from Continuing Operations

As disclosed in Council's Income Statement the year's operations resulted in a deficit from continuing operations after capital amounts of \$614,000 (2011 - \$665,000 surplus). Some items of note in the income statement include:

- The operating deficit from continuing operations *before* capital amounts was \$1,353,000 (2011 \$724,000 deficit).
- Rates and annual charges increased by \$16,000 to \$1,275,000 (2011 \$1,259,000). Ordinary rates increased by \$21,000 to \$634,000 in accordance with rate pegging limits. Annual charges increased by \$3,000 to \$617,000. Domestic waste management services increased by \$8,000 to \$287,000 due to an increase in charges while water supply services decreased slightly by \$4,000 to \$248,000.
- User charges and fees increased by \$420,000 to \$2,501,000 (2011 \$2,081,000). Domestic waste management increased by \$47,000 to \$61,000 due to an increase in fees and charges. Water supply services increased by \$41,000 to \$361,000 due increased water usage as rainfall fell to normal levels compared to a wet prior year. Private works increased by \$31,000 to \$44,000 due to transport infrastructure works near Ivanhoe for a mining company. RMS charges state roads increased by \$295,000 to \$1,928,000 due to more works orders from the RMS on state roads being performed during the year as a result of flood damage.
- Investment revenues decreased by \$411,000 to \$88,000. Interest revenues increased by \$38,000 to \$223,000 due to higher interest rates on investments. Conversely, the fair value of the CDO decreased by \$135,000 compared to a \$314,000 increase in the prior year.
- Grant and contributions provided for operating purposes increased by \$939,000 to \$10,683,000 (2011 \$9,744,000). The financial assistance grant increased by \$945,000 to \$4,455,000 due to the first two instalments of the 2012/2013 year being received in June 2012. Flood restoration decreased by \$578,000 to \$2,645,000 due to less funding required for repairs to local and regional flood damaged roads. RMS contributions increased by \$616,000 to \$2,314,000 due to more works being performed on repairs and maintenance compared to capital road works in the prior year.
- Grants and contributions provided for capital purposes decreased by \$650,000 to \$739,000 (2011 \$1,389,000). Roads and bridges decreased by \$148,000 due to grants for towns signs of \$50,000 and airport improvements of \$98,000 not recurring this year. RMS contributions decreased by \$600,000 due to funding being spent on repairs and maintenance work compared to capitalised roads during the prior year.
- Employee benefits and on-costs decreased by \$430,000 to \$4,602,000 (2011 \$5,032,000). Salaries and wages decreased by \$371,000 to \$3,727,000 due to vacant positions not being filled during the year. Workers' compensation insurance decreased by \$29,000 to \$158,000 due to an improved rolling claims history over the past three years and lower salaries and wages. Training cost increased by \$116,000 to \$186,000 due more employee training being provided during the year.
- Depreciation expense increased by \$76,000 to \$2,694,000. The major expenses were for roads, bridges and footpaths for \$1,250,000, water supply network for \$525,000 and buildings for \$360,000.
- Materials and contracts increased by \$1,886,000 to \$7,434,000 (2011 \$5,548,000). This was consistent with Council's maintenance programme and impacted by flood damaged road works during the year.

Other expenses decreased by \$73,000 to \$1,343,000 [2011 - \$1,416,000]. This was due to a decrease in bad and doubtful debts of \$184,000 as the provision for impairment was decreased due to a change in the assessment of the certainty over the collection of some receivables. Electricity and heating increased by \$32,000 to \$159,000 due to an increase in tariff charges and consumption.

(b) Financial Position

The Balance Sheet disclosed that for the year ended 30 June 2012 Council's net assets stood at \$138,504,000 (2011 - \$139,118,000) which represents a decrease of \$614,000 being the net operating deficit after capital amounts.

To assess the appropriateness or otherwise of Council's net current asset position (available working capital) it is necessary to review the level of restrictions placed against the use of Council's assets. The notes to the financial statements indicate clearly where restrictions exist and the effect of the restrictions is summarised as follows:-

Council's deficit of net assets to cover the restrictions in place has deteriorated over the past year to a deficit of \$761,000. This position is driven by Council's poor level of cash and investments. Council received \$1,850,000 of the financial assistance grant in advance in June 2012, but was only able to place a restriction of \$705,000. Council needs to be mindful that a net surplus of current assets is important, if it wishes to fund restrictions without the reliance on future revenues or loan funding.

Since July 2007, global financial markets have experienced a period of high volatility led by events in the US housing market, particularly sub prime loans, which has impacted the value, recoverability, liquidity, cash flows and rates of return of many financial assets including Collateralised Debt Obligations (CDO's), Equity Linked Notes (ELN's) and certain other Managed Funds.

As at 30 June 2012, Central Darling Shire Council's investment portfolio totalled \$2,934,000 and included securities totalling \$1,084,000 that have been impacted by this market volatility. The impact on individual securities varies depending on their degree of exposure to affected markets.

Many of these securities do not have market values that are independently quoted and they are not widely traded. Independent market valuations are not readily available and in many cases, values are assessed based on estimates from issuers and/or valuation models for which there is limited market evidence available to verify their reasonableness. Further, the ongoing volatility of financial markets creates greater uncertainty to the valuation process.

These circumstances have resulted in our inability to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to satisfy ourselves as to the fair value and recoverability of \$1,084,000 of Council's total investment portfolio. Accordingly we have issued a qualified auditor's opinion on Council's general purpose financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2012.

Liquidity

Note 6 to the accounts discloses total cash and investments of \$2,934,000 [2011 - \$3,698,000]. Of this amount \$2,229,000 [2011 - \$2,926,000] is subject to external restrictions requiring Council to commit those funds to the purposes for which they were provided and \$705,000 (2011 - \$746,000) is subject to internal restrictions agreed upon by Council for designated purposes which may be altered at the discretion of Council, consistent with their management plan.

Council has no unrestricted cash (2011 - \$26,000). Unrestricted cash represents funds available to cover non-budgeted discretionary expenditure and short-term cash flow requirements.

Council's liquidity has deteriorated significantly over the past year and is a major concern for the Council. Council received \$1,850,000 of the financial assistance grant in advance in June 2012. If not for this funding, the Council's bank account would have been in overdraft at year end. Council still cannot access the CDO investment of \$1,500,000 (face value) and are hoping that when it matures next year that they will receive most, if not all, of their money back. The poor liquidity position this year is largely driven by the timing flood damage funding. The Council is required to complete work in advance of payment. As it result, it may have performed a few hundred thousand dollars worth of work before being paid a few months later. At year end, Council had an unused overdraft facility of \$1,000,000 in place, but we noted in November 2012 it became necessary for this facility to be extended to \$1,500,000.

This poor cash position will have a major impact in Council being able to deliver services into the future.

Council will need to be extremely conscious that s.409 of the Local Government Act 1993 states that money that is subject to the provisions of this or any other Act (being provisions that state that the money may be used only for a specific purpose) may be used only for that purpose.

This means that at any time during the forthcoming year, Council is still required to have sufficient cash assets to cover any external restrictions that are in place at that time. Any "dipping" into the restricted funds is in breach of the Act.

As a result, Council will need to closely monitor its budgeted expenditure to improve its cash position and ensure cash savings are made across the course of the next year. In addition, Council may need to consider loan funding for any capital project.

(c) Performance Indicators

Note 13 to the financial statements provide a measure of Council's performance using a number of selected ratios as follows:

Unrestricted Current Ratio

The unrestricted current ratio is a measure of Council's liquidity and demonstrates Council's ability to satisfy obligations out of short-term and immediate asset balances. Council's ratio of 0.97:1 (2011 – 1.56:1) is considered poor. This ratio can deteriorate quickly based on the above comments in relation to liquidity. We stress the importance of considering these ratios in conjunction with other performance indicators and not in isolation.

Debt Service Ratio

The cost of repaying debt is reflected in the debt service ratio, which expresses that cost as a percentage of revenue from ordinary activities. Whilst there is no definitive guide on what constitutes an acceptable ratio it is generally accepted that a ratio of 10% to 20% is considered tolerable depending on the level of long-term development (infrastructure) plans and funding of entrepreneurial activities. At 0.78% (2011 – 0.88%), Central Darling Shire Council's ratio is well below these industry benchmarks.

Rate Coverage Ratio

The rate coverage ratio indicates the proportion of total revenue that is generated by rates. A changing ratio may indicate a change in the mix of Council's revenue streams. These revenue streams would include rates, user charges, grants, contributions and income from entrepreneurial activities.

Council's ratio of 8.14% (2011 - 8.22%) is lower than the previous year. This ratio is extremely low in relation to other Council's due to the shires' location and population demographics. As a result it highlights Council's dependence on grant revenues and is critical in terms of the perspective that it places on Council's unrestricted current and debt service ratios.

Rates and Annual Charges Outstanding Ratio

The rates and annual charges outstanding percentage is a measure of management efficiency. Whilst prevailing economic conditions may influence Council's ability to collect revenue, the efficiency and application of collection procedures are still the largest determinant of this ratio.

Central Darling Shire Council's rates and annual charges outstanding percentage of 19.52% has decreased since the prior year (2011 – 28.04%). This ratio has improved significantly on prior year, however remains very high.

Typically the provision for impairment (\$425,000 in 2012) is high for Council which in turn reduces this ratio due to the poor financial position of many of Council's ratepayers who have continued to be adversely affected by extreme weather conditions, as well as the high level of unemployment in the Shire's towns.

Building and Infrastructure Renewals Ratio

The purpose of this ratio is to assess the rate at which infrastructure assets are being renewed against the rate at which they are depreciating.

The distinction between replacements, renewals and repairs is not well defined, making it difficult to make meaningful analysis with this ratio. However, in 2012 the ratio was 90.35% compared to 66.21% in 2011 indicating that depreciation expense was higher this year than the amount spent on renewal of those infrastructure assets.

(d) Statement of Cash Flows

The Statement of Cash Flows reports a net decrease in cash assets held of \$629,000 (2011 - \$1,306,000 increase) as follows:

Cash Flows from Operating Activities

The net cash flow provided by operating activities totalled \$2,788,000 (2011 - \$3,161,000). The decrease of \$373,000 was largely impacted as a result of an increase in rates and annual charges of \$284,000, an increase in user charges and fees of \$529,000 and a decrease of \$530,000 in grants and contributions. Materials and contracts increased by \$2,046,000 while employee costs decreased by \$609,000.

Cash Flows from Investing Activities

The net cash flow used in investing activities totalled \$3,360,000 (2011 – \$1,801,000). The major cash outflow related to the purchase of infrastructure, property, plant and equipment of \$3,539,000.

Major additions to infrastructure, property, plant and equipment during the year included \$2,158,000 on roads, bridges and footpaths infrastructure, \$733,000 capital works in progress and \$465,000 on plant and equipment.

Cash Flows from Financing Activities

The net cash flow used in financing activities was \$57,000 (2011 - \$54,000). This represents normal repayments of the loan during the year.

(e) Comparison of Actual and Budgeted Performance

Council's change in net assets from operations for the year of was a deficit of \$614,000 compared to a budgeted surplus of \$169,000.

The purpose of this report is not to provide detailed analysis of individual budget variations. Council's financial statements include Note 16, which addressed the contributing factors to these variations in detail.

Other Matters

(a) National Competition Policy

In accordance with the requirements of National Competition Policy guidelines, Central Darling Shire Council has prepared special purpose financial statements on its business units for the year ended 30 June 2012. Council has determined that it has two business units within its operations: Water and Sewerage.

The Division of Local Government's July 1997 guidelines 'Pricing and Costing for Council Businesses: A Guide to Competitive Neutrality' outlines the process for identifying and allocating costs of activities and provide a standard of disclosure requirements. These disclosures are reflected in Council's pricing and/or financial reporting systems and include taxation equivalents, Council subsidies, rate of return on investments in business units and dividends paid.

An unqualified audit report on the special purpose reports for the year ended 30 June 2012 has been issued.

(b) Management Letters

An interim management letter was issued during the year and a final management letter will be issued within the next few weeks.

(c) Legislative Compliance

As a result of our audit we advise that Central Darling Shire Council did not comply with the provisions of Section 416 of the Local Government Act (NSW) 1993, which requires that the financial statements be prepared and audited within four months of the end of the financial year. Aside from that breach, there are no material deficiencies in the accounting records or financial reports that have come to our attention during the conduct of the audit and Central Darling Shire Council's accounting records have been kept in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Act, 1993 and regulations.

(d) Qualified Auditor's Opinion on Councils General Purpose Financial Statements

Council's general purpose financial statements was issued subject to a qualified auditor's opinion in relation to our inability to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to satisfy ourselves as to the fair value and recoverability of \$1,084,000 of Council's total investment portfolio.

(e) Matters Relating to the Electronic Presentation of the Audited Financial Statements

This auditor's report relates to the financial statements of Central Darling Shire Council for the year ended 30 June 2012 included on Council's web site. Council is responsible for the integrity of Council's web site. We have not been engaged to report on the integrity of the web site. The auditor's report refers only to the statements named above. It does not provide an opinion on any other information which may have been hyperlinked to/from these statements. If users of this report are concerned with the inherent risks arising from electronic data communications they are advised to refer to the hard copy of the audited financial statements to confirm the information included in the audited financial statements presented on this web site.

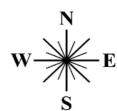

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Background

- (i) These Special Purpose Financial Statements have been prepared for the use by both Council and the Division of Local Government in fulfilling their requirements under National Competition Policy.
- (ii) The principle of competitive neutrality is based on the concept of a "level playing field" between persons/entities competing in a market place, particularly between private and public sector competitors.
 - Essentially, the principle is that government businesses, whether Commonwealth, State or Local, should operate without net competitive advantages over other businesses as a result of their public ownership.
- (iii) For Council, the principle of competitive neutrality & public reporting applies only to declared business activities.
 - These include **(a)** those activities classified by the Australian Bureau of Statistics as business activities being water supply, sewerage services, abattoirs, gas production and reticulation and **(b)** those activities with a turnover of over \$2 million that Council has formally declared as a Business Activity (defined as Category 1 activities).
- (iv) In preparing these financial statements for Council's self classified Category 1 businesses and ABS defined activities, councils must (a) adopt a corporatisation model and (b) apply full cost attribution including tax equivalent regime payments & debt guarantee fees (where the business benefits from councils borrowing position by comparison with commercial rates).

Note 1. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements are a Special Purpose Financial Statements (SPFS) prepared for use by Council and the Division of Local Government.

For the purposes of these statements, the Council's business activities (reported herein) are not reporting entities.

These special purpose financial statements, unless otherwise stated, have been prepared in accordance with;

- applicable Australian Accounting Standards,
- other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board,
- Australian Accounting Interpretations,
- the Local Government Act and Regulation, and
- the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting.

The statements are also prepared on an accruals basis. They are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values nor current values of non-current assets (except where specifically stated).

Certain taxes and other costs (appropriately described) have been imputed for the purposes of the National Competition Policy.

National Competition Policy

Council has adopted the principle of 'competitive neutrality' to its business activities as part of the national competition policy which is being applied throughout Australia at all levels of government.

The framework for its application is set out in the June 1996 Government Policy statement on the "Application of National Competition Policy to Local Government".

The "Pricing & Costing for Council Businesses A Guide to Competitive Neutrality" issued by the Division of Local Government in July 1997 has also been adopted.

The pricing & costing guidelines outline the process for identifying and allocating costs to activities and provide a standard of disclosure requirements. These disclosures are reflected in Council's pricing and/or financial reporting systems and include taxation equivalents; council subsidies; return on investments (rate of return); and dividends paid.

Declared Business Activities

In accordance with *Pricing & Costing for Council Businesses - A Guide to Competitive Neutrality,* Council has declared that the following are to be considered as business activities:

Category 1

(where gross operating turnover is over \$2 million)

Nil

Category 2

(where gross operating turnover is less than \$2 million)

a. Combined Water Supply

The Central Darling Shire Water Supply comprises the operations and assets of Council's Water Supply System which services the towns of Wilcannia, Ivanhoe and White Cliffs.

b. Sewerage Services

The Central Darling Shire Sewerage Service comprises the whole of the operations and assets of Council's Sewerage Reticulation and Treatment System servicing the township of Wilcannia.

(i) Taxation Equivalent Charges

Council is liable to pay various taxes and financial duties in undertaking its business activities. Where this is the case, they are disclosed in these statements as a cost of operations just like all other costs.

However, where Council is exempt from paying taxes which are generally paid by private sector businesses (such as income tax), equivalent tax payments have been applied to all Council nominated business activities and are reflected in these financial statements.

For the purposes of disclosing comparative information relevant to the private sector equivalent,

the following taxation equivalents have been applied to all council nominated business activities (this does not include council's non-business activities):

Notional Rate Applied %

Corporate Income Tax Rate - 30%

<u>Land Tax</u> – The first **\$396,000** of combined land values attracts **0%**. From \$396,001 to \$2,421,000 the rate is **1.6%** + **\$100**. For the remaining combined land value that exceeds \$2,421,000, a premium marginal rate of **2.0%** applies.

<u>Payroll Tax</u> – **5.45%** on the value of taxable salaries and wages in excess of \$678,000.

Income Tax

An income tax equivalent has been applied on the profits of the business.

Whilst income tax is not a specific cost for the purpose of pricing a good or service, it needs to be taken into account of in terms of assessing the rate of return required on capital invested.

Accordingly, the return on capital invested is set at a pre-tax level (gain/(loss) from ordinary activities before capital amounts) as would be applied by a private sector competitor – that is, it should include a provision equivalent to the corporate income tax rate, currently 30%.

Income Tax is only applied where a positive gain/(loss) from ordinary activities before capital amounts has been achieved.

Since this taxation equivalent is notional - that is, it is payable to the "Council" as the owner of business operations, it represents an internal payment and has no effect on the operations of the council. Accordingly, there is no need for disclosure of internal charges in Council's GPFS.

The rate applied of 30% is the equivalent company tax rate prevalent as at balance date. No adjustments have been made for variations that have occurred during the year.

Local Government Rates & Charges

A calculation of the equivalent rates and charges payable on all Category 1 businesses has been applied to all land assets owned or exclusively used by the business activity.

Loan & Debt Guarantee Fees

The debt guarantee fee is designed to ensure that council business activities face "true" commercial borrowing costs in line with private sector competitors.

In order to calculate a debt guarantee fee, council has determined what the differential borrowing rate would have been between the commercial rate and the council's borrowing rate for its business activities.

(ii) Subsidies

Government policy requires that subsidies provided to customers and the funding of those subsidies must be explicitly disclosed.

Subsidies occur where council provides services on a less than cost recovery basis. This option is exercised on a range of services in order for council to meet its community service obligations.

Accordingly, Subsidies disclosed (in relation to National Competition Policy) represents the difference between revenue generated from 'rate of return' pricing and revenue generated from prices set by the council in any given financial year.

The overall effect of subsidies is contained within the Income Statement of Business Activities.

(iii) Return on Investments (Rate of Return)

The Policy statement requires that councils with Category 1 businesses "would be expected to generate a return on capital funds employed that is comparable to rates of return for private businesses operating in a similar field".

Such funds are subsequently available for meeting commitments or financing future investment strategies.

Note 1. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The Rate of Return on Capital is calculated as follows:

Operating Result before Capital Income + Interest Expense

Written Down Value of I,PP&E as at 30 June

As a minimum, business activities should generate a return equal to the Commonwealth 10 year bond rate which is 3.03% at 30/6/12.

The actual rate of return achieved by each business activity is disclosed at the foot of each respective Income Statement.

(iv) Dividends

Council is not required to pay dividends to either itself as owner of a range of businesses or to any external entities.

Local Government Water Supply and Sewerage Businesses are permitted to pay an annual dividend from its water supply or sewerage business surplus.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE SPECIAL PURPOSE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF CENTRAL DARLING SHIRE COUNCIL

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of Central Darling Shire Council for the year ended 30 June 2012, comprising the Statement by Council, Income Statement by Business Activities, Balance Sheet by Business Activities and accompanying Notes to the Financial Statements. Our audit responsibility does not extend to the best practice management disclosures in Notes 2 and 3 and accordingly we express no opinion on them.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the Council as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Application of the requirements of section 416 of the Local Government Act 1993.

Without qualification to the opinion expressed above, attention is drawn to the date of issue of the financial statements. We note that the financial statements have not been completed within four months of the end of the financial year, as required by section 416 (5).

Accordingly this aspect of the financial statements does not comply with the Local Government Act 1993, Chapter 13, Part 3, Division 2.

Basis of Accounting

Without modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 to the financial statements, which describe the basis of accounting. The special purpose financial statements have been prepared for distribution to the Council and the Division of Local Government for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements of National Competition Policy reporting. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial statements to which it relates to any person other than the Council or the Division of Local Government or for any purpose other than for which the statements were prepared.

Engineering and supervision (1)

(item 1b of Special Schedules 3 and 5) comprises the following:

 - Travelling expenses
 - Accrual of leave entitlements
 - Employment overheads.
- Other technical and supervision staff:
 - Salaries and allowance
 - Travelling expenses
 - Accrual of leave entitlements
 - Employment overheads.

Operational expenses (item 2 of Special Schedules 3 and 5) comprise the day to day operational expenses excluding maintenance expenses.

Maintenance expenses (item 2 of Special Schedules 3 and 5) comprise the day to day repair and maintenance expenses. (Refer to Section 5 of the Local Government Asset Accounting Manual regarding capitalisation principles and the distinction between capital and maintenance expenditure).

Other expenses (item 4c of Special Schedules 3 and 5) includes all expenses not recorded elsewhere.

Revaluation decrements (item 4b of Special Schedules 3 and 5) is to be used when I,PP&E decreases in FV.

Residential charges ⁽²⁾ (items 6a, 6b and item 6 of Special Schedules 3 and 5 respectively) include all income from residential charges. Item 6 of Schedule 3 should be separated into 6a Access Charges (including rates if applicable) and 6b Usage Charges.

Non-residential charges ⁽²⁾ (items 7a, 7b of Special Schedules 3 and 5) include all income from non-residential charges separated into 7a Access Charges (including rates if applicable) and 7b Usage Charges.

Trade waste charges (item 8 of Special Schedule 5) include all income from trade waste charges separated into 8a Annual Fees, 8b Usage Charges and 8c Excess Mass Charges and 8d Re-inspection Fees.

Other income (items 10 and 11 of Special Schedules 3 and 5 respectively) include all income not recorded elsewhere.

Other contributions (items 12c and 13c of Special Schedules 3 and 5 respectively) incl. capital contributions for water supply or sewerage services received by Council under Section 565 of the Local Government Act.

Notes:

- (1) Administration and engineering costs for the development of capital works projects should be reported as part of the capital cost of the project and not as part of the recurrent expenditure (ie. in item 16 for water supply and item 17 for sewerage, and **not** in items 1a and 1b).
- (2) To enable accurate reporting of **residential revenue from usage charges**, it is essential for councils to accurately separate their residential (item 6) charges and non-residential (item 7) charges.

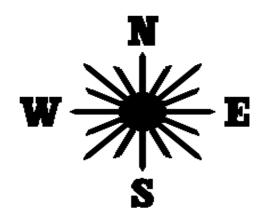










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INTRODUCTION

This State of the Environment Report provides the thirteenth report towards better co-ordination between environmental information and identified future projects required to improve the local state of the environment.

Council will use State of the Environment Reports as a guidance tool for future environmental management.

Central Darling Shire Council's State of the Environment Report for 2010/2011 is the next step in this process; it identifies issues, provides information sources and gaps. It also continues to identify potential indicators and baselines for the future.

Aims and Objectives

Central Darling Shire Council's State of the Environment Report has the following aims:

- a) To educate the community about their local environment and how it is affected by human activities
- b) To provide the public with an account of the activities of government and industry and community aims at restoring the environment
- c) To ensure the Central Darling Shire Council's surrounding environment is protected, preserved and enhanced to promote a healthy and safe lifestyle for future generations.

Not all of these aims are achievable in the short term. To work towards achieving these aims, Central Darling Shire Council is committed to fulfilling the following objectives:

- a) To develop a framework for Central Darling Shire Council State of the Environment Reporting
- b) To identify environmental issues, sources of information and gaps
- c) To prioritise issues for future work
- d) To determine if additional theme areas are required.

Information from the State of the Environment Report will assist in supporting Total Catchment Management (TCM) principles: the co-ordinated and sustainable use and management of land, water, vegetation and other natural resources on a water catchment basis which balances resource utilisation and conservation.

PART 1: CURRENT STATE OF THE ENVIRONMENT

1.1 Central Darling Shire Council

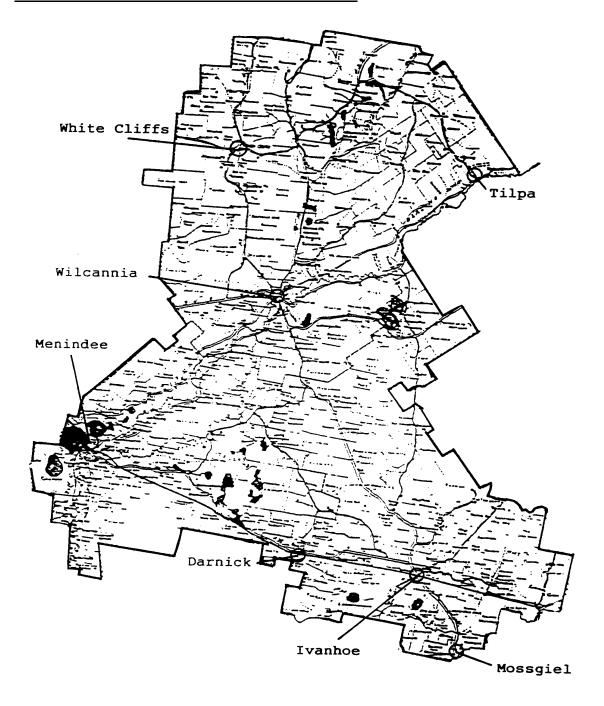
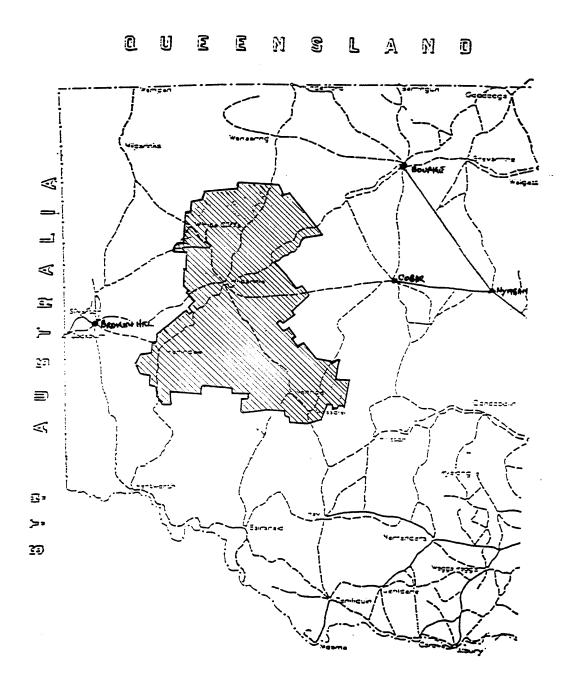


FIGURE 2: LOCATION OF THE CENTRAL DARLING SHIRE COUNCIL

Central Darling Shire Council is the largest Council area in New South Wales serving a population of approximately 2000 (as per the Australian Bureau of Statistic), and covering an area of some 51,395 square kilometres (see Figure 1). It is located in the far west of New South Wales (see Figure 2) where a dry climate is predominant.

Central Darling Shire Council has a distributed average yearly rainfall of 249 millimetres (Bureau of Meteorology 2011) and characteristically hot summers (19-48 degrees celcius). Winters are typically cold (1-17 degrees celcius). Winds are quite variable throughout the year but predominantly south to southeast in summer and south, southwest to westerly in winter (Bureau of Meteorology 2010).

Central Darling Shire Council plays host to four towns and three rural locations. The towns in the Central Darling Shire Council are Wilcannia, Menindee, Ivanhoe and White Cliffs. The Rural Locations are Tilpa, Darnick and Mossgiel. The topography of the Central Darling Shire Council is quite variable due to the large area the Council covers, further details of topography and towns will be discussed later in this report (see towns and villages).

European settlement commenced in the Central Darling Shire Council area around 1850 leading to degradation of the native flora and fauna by grazing and the introduction of feral animals.

Since this time, there has been no dramatic change in land use. Major efforts are being made to control degradation by reducing feral animal numbers, the introduction of National Parks and Wildlife and also many rural properties becoming wildlife refuges or game reserves. Public awareness in environmental issues is assisting in the reduction of degradation.

Unfortunately the Central Darling Shire Council has experienced a decline in population since early settlement due to road transport replacing paddle steamers and the closure of Government Organisations such as the Telecom Line yard, Roads and Traffic Authority Depot and New South Wales State Rail Depot, this in turn has seen the closure of business houses that were dependant on their trade.

FIGURE 1: CENTRAL DARLING SHIRE COUNCIL AREA

1.2 Towns and Villages

1.2.1 Wilcannia

Wilcannia is the largest town in Central Darling Shire Council (see Figure 3) with a population of approximately 759 (ABS, 2006 Census QuickStata) it is situated on the banks of the Darling River in about the central Darling Shire Council (see Figure 1).

The Barrier Highway is considered to be one of the main highway links between east and west and passes through the township of Wilcannia, assisting the economy of the town by the supply of essential services to the tourist and transport industry.

The township of Wilcannia was notified on 26 June 1866 and in 1880 had a population of 3000; it was then known as "the Queen City of the West". Wilcannia was one of the major River ports of the Murray Darling system having, at one time, 30 paddle steamers loading or unloading at once. Many fine buildings from the era still remain in good condition making Wilcannia one of New South Wales' historic towns. The main office of the Central Darling Shire Council is located in one of these fine old buildings which is built of sandstone quarried locally, as are other historic buildings in town.

Aboriginal people have a unique place in our society, as the Barkandji tribe held the Central Darling Shire Council area around Wilcannia. Many of the Aboriginal people living in Wilcannia today belong to that tribe. Aboriginal people make up about 64.2% (as per Australian Bureau of Statistics) percent of Wilcannia's population, giving Wilcannia a unique opportunity to promote and preserve Aboriginal Culture.

The topography of the Wilcannia region has slightly undulating plains, dunes and alluvial plains bordering flood plains; relief to five metres; plains with sandy yellow texture-contrast and alluvial soils; sparse black box and prickly wattle and clumps of narrow-leaf hop bush and turpentine; moderate black blue bushes; bottle washers and annual forbs; dunes with sands and sandy texture-contrast soils with fringing black box, tall kerosene grass and variable spear grass; intrusions of grey cracking-clay with sparse black box, copper burrs, saltbushes and annual forbs.

West of Wilcannia has dune fields with east-west trending dunes, broad swales and small drainage areas; relief to five metres; calcerous red earths, solonized brown soils, red sands and red sandy earth; scattered to moderate mulga, belah and rosewood; clumped narrow-leaf hop bush and punty bush; variable spear grass, cannon-ball, copper burrs and forbs.

East of Wilcannia has the open level floodplain of the Darling River, with grey gilgaid and crabholey, cracking heavy clays; small cane grass or lignum pans; minor drainage channels sometimes with black box and coolabah and scaldy grey clays; fringing brown and red cracking clays; abundant annual forbs, copper burrs and annual saltbushes. Also, sand plains with widely spaced east-west trending linear dunes and broad sandy rises, few small depressions; relief to seven metres; solonized brown soils and areas of reddish texture-contrast soils, deep sands and sandy earths on dunes and rises, loamy solonized brown soils and non-cracking clays in depressions; sparse belah, rosewood, nelia and mallee; locally dense black and punty bush; black box and bimble box in depressions; variable spear grass, bottle washers, copper burrs and forbs.

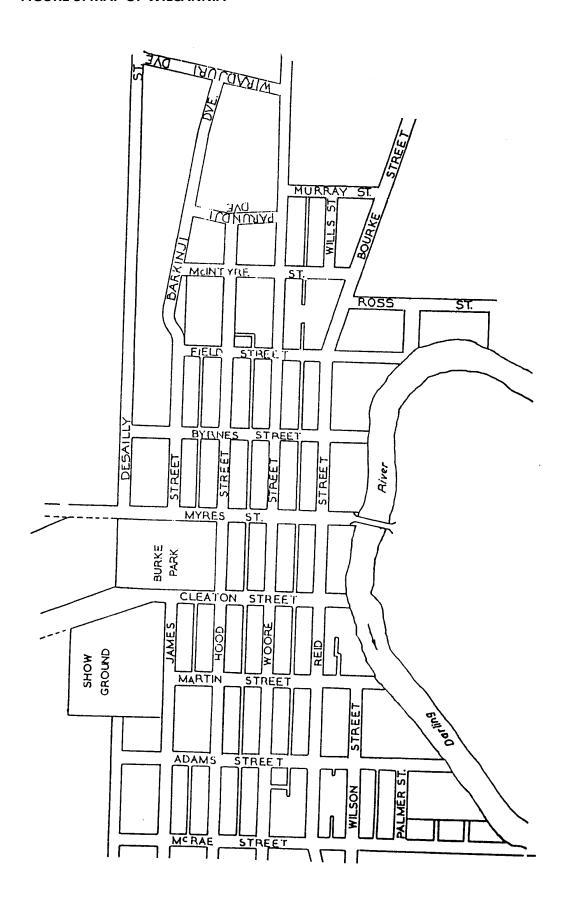
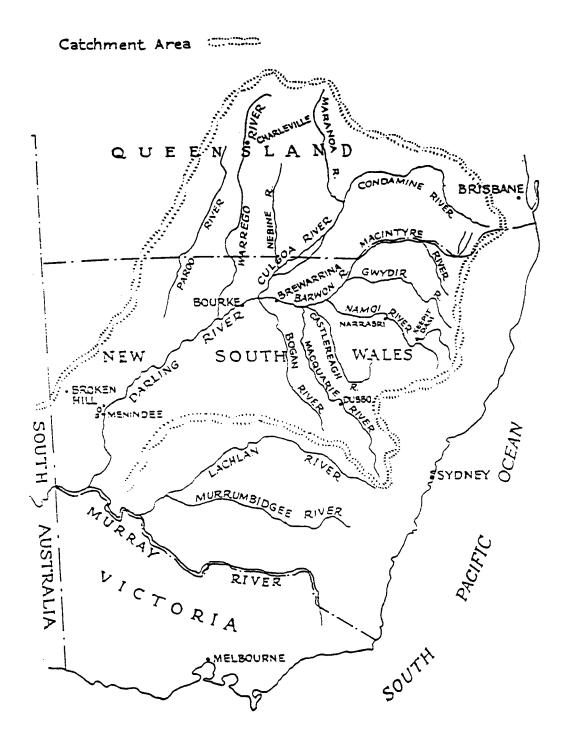


FIGURE 4: THE DARLING CATCHMENT AND MENINDEE STORAGES

Much of the landscape surrounding Wilcannia is prone to flooding from the Darling River as a result of waters caught in the Darling Catchment area (see Figure 4).

FIGURE 3: MAP OF WILCANNIA

1.2.2 Menindee and Environs

Menindee is the second largest town in the Central Darling Shire Council area (see Figure 1) - with a population of 631 (ABS, 2006 Census QuickStats) - however Menindee and Environs cover a larger area than other towns in the Shire (see Figure 5).

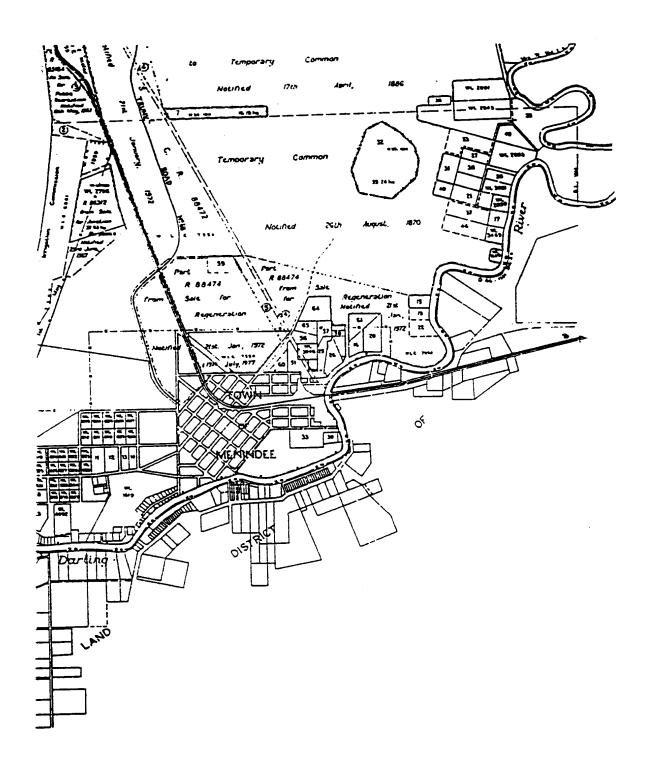


FIGURE 6: LOCATION OF SUNSET STRIP AND COPI HOLLOW

The Environs consist of mainly fruit growing blocks (generally for grapes) around the outskirts of town located along the banks of the Darling River. Also included in the Environs area are the two locations of Sunset Strip and Copi Hollow (see Figure 6). Both situated on lakes west of Menindee, these locations are known as holiday shack areas mainly used for recreation.

Menindee, like other towns in the Central Darling Shire Council area, has many historical features that remain from the early pioneer days, such as the expedition of Burke and Wills using Menindee as a base.

Today's residents of Menindee are composed of different European backgrounds mainly involved in the fruit growing industry. Like Wilcannia, Menindee has a large Aboriginal population 27.9% giving it a unique opportunity to promote and preserve Aboriginal Culture.

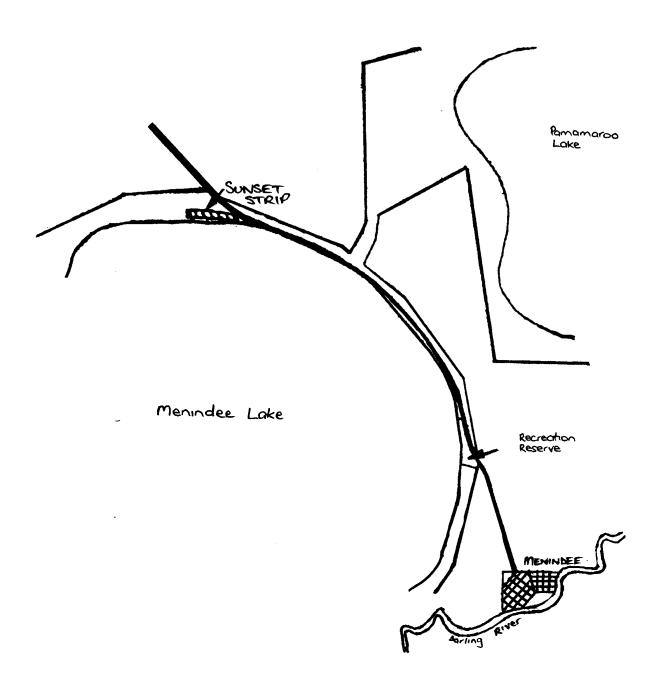
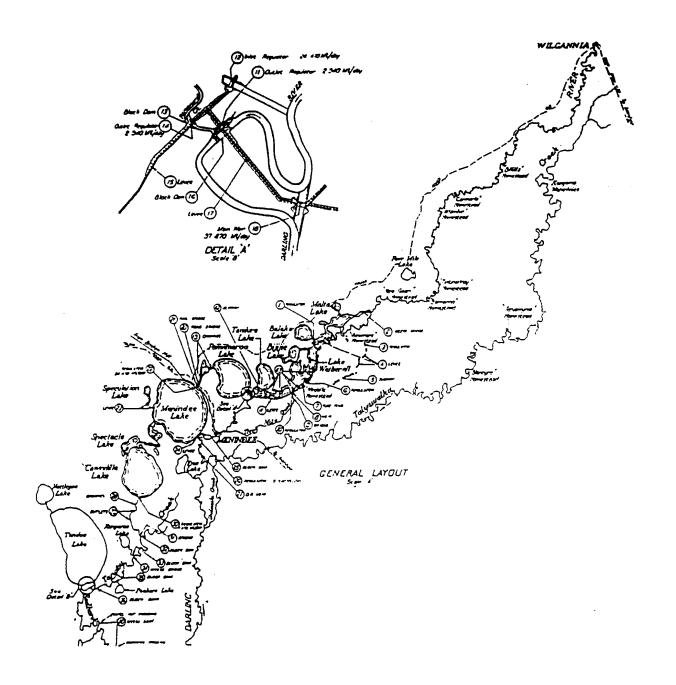


FIGURE 7: MENINDEE STORAGE AND WATER SUPPLY

Menindee plays a major role in the storage of water associated with the Murray Darling Catchment Area through a series of lakes and regulator weirs (see Figure 7). State Water controls the Menindee Lakes Storage Scheme.

The topography of Menindee and Environs is mainly alluvial plains consisting of broad floodplain with associated billabongs, swamps, back channels, levees and sand hills; channels incised to 15 metres; grey self-mulching silty clays, calcerous loamy sand to deep sandy red soils on levees and sand hills; river red gum along channels, black box and river cooba elsewhere over scattered or dense stands of lignum (or cane grass) and nitre goosefoot, sparse grass-forb pastures and abundant ephemerals after flooding.

West of Menindee has broad east-west trending dunes and irregular rises, broad swales and small depressions; relief to 10 metres; sandy red earths and calcerous red earths; scattered bellah, bands of narrow-leaf hop bush, clumps of turpentine, scattered to dense black blue bush; variable spear grass, bottle washers, copper burrs and forbs.

FIGURE 5: MENINDEE TOWN AND ENVIRONS

1.2.3 Ivanhoe

The township of Ivanhoe (see Figure 8) is the third largest town - with a population of 400 (ABS, 2006 Census QuickStats) - in the Central Darling Shire and is situated in the southern region of the Council area (see Figure 1).

Ivanhoe is mainly a service town to the rural sector, although in the past played a vital link for the transport of freight to the Central Darling Shire Council by having, a rail station, goods yard and maintenance section. Unfortunately the State Rail Authority terminated its goods yard facility and passenger service and scaled down its maintenance section in 1994.

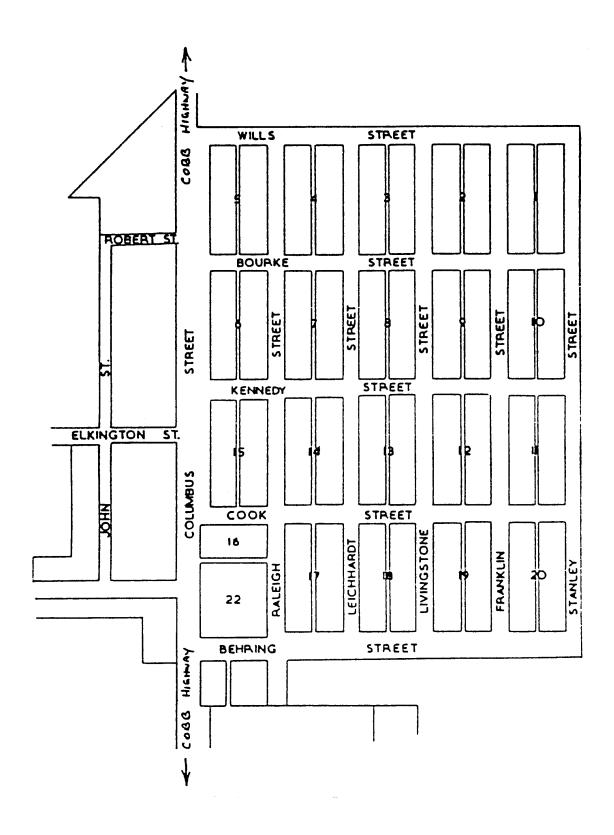
Ivanhoe has a place in history being a part of the vital link for Cobb and Co coach routes, as coaches passed through Ivanhoe on route from Melbourne to the gold rush areas in the north around the 1950's.

The Cobb Highway passes through the township of Ivanhoe and derived its name from the early pioneers, Cobb and Co.

Although Ivanhoe is not located on or near a river, when seasons permit it derives its water from Willandra Creek, located approximately 27 kilometres west of Ivanhoe; the water is stored in a Catchment tank and pumped to Ivanhoe Township. The Willandra Creek is often dry due to ongoing droughts, for this reason two bores were put down and the township of Ivanhoe can be supplied with bore water that is pumped into two resovoir tanks (one for filtered water use and the other for raw water). As there has been good rain in the catchment area and water has been let out of the Lachlan River to the Willandra Creek, the creek water is available to be used again instead of bore water.

The topography of the Ivanhoe Region has level sand plains of deep loamy to loamy sand solonized brown soils, scattered low dunes of sandy red earths; relief to 5 metres; dense groves of belah, with rosewood, mulga and wilga; scattered inedible woody shrubs; copper burrs and narrow-leaf hopbush on sandy soils; dense bimble box in drainage sinks; abundant bottle washers, cannon-ball, variable spear grass and forbs.

1.2.4 White Cliffs

Situated in the far west of New South Wales, White Cliffs is approximately 100 kilometres north of Wilcannia and 260 kilometres northeast of Broken Hill (see Figure 9).

Reports show that opal was found in White Cliffs around 1884, and with the registration of the first claim being on 21 March 1890, Opal has been extensively mined since that date. The White Cliffs Opal fields still support an active opal mining industry, with 308 registered mining claims, of 50x50 metres in size, being granted in the area.

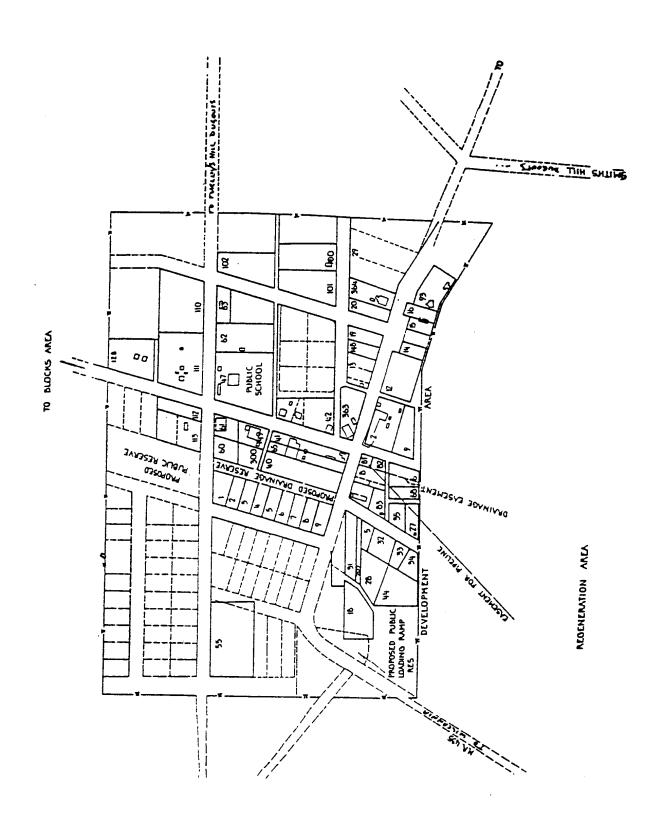
There are today however, only about 6 full time miners working in the field, with the majority of miners spending only part of the year in White Cliffs. There is also a strong contingent of holiday miners and tourists who become involved in mining.

The township of White Cliffs is closely dependent on opal mining and the field itself for the stimulation of its economy and as the main attraction for the very important tourist industry in the area.

The town has a fluctuating population of 150 to 350 people (ABS, 2006 Census QuickStats, 181 people were living in White Cliffs), with most people living in underground dugouts situated on the three hills surrounding the town, being Smith's Hill, Turley's Hill and The Blocks. Extensive efforts have been made in promoting White Cliffs as a tourist destination in recent years.

The Topography of White Cliffs is undulating stony plains with relief to 20 metres; contour bands of stone-free yellowish-red massive loams with saltbush and blue bush alternating with bare stony brown desert loams; dark stony and rocky rises with shallow loamy lithosols and scattered mulga; drainage tracts with deep yellowish-red loamy sands; moderately dense belah, mulga and blue bush.

1.3. Rural Locations

1.3.1 Mossgiel

Mossgiel is located at the southern tip of Central Darling Shire Council (see Figure 1) 50 kilometres south of Ivanhoe and 235 kilometres from Wilcannia situated on the Cobb Highway, it is the focus point of the surrounding rural community comprising of a local community hall.

The topography of the Mossgiel area has level relict floodplain with prior streams and shallow drainage depressions; relief to one metre; grey, brown and red cracking and non-cracking clays, and red and brown texture-contrast soils; treeless except for black box in depressions; small stands of bladder saltbush, cotton bush, black, blue bush, nitre goosefoot and Dillon bush; copper burrs, annual saltbushes, grasses and forbs.

Moving west of Mossgiel there are extensive, slightly undulating sand plains with isolated small depressions; sand plains of calcerous earths and sandy red and brown texture-contrast soils with scattered clumps of rosewood and belah, moderate to dense stands of black or pearl blue bush, abundant short grasses and forbs; areas of deeper sandy soils with scattered white cypress pine; depressions of grey clay with cane grass, rimmed by scalded red texture-contrast soils.

1.3.2 Darnick

Darnick is located south in the Central Darling Shire Council (see Figure 1), 70 kilometres from Ivanhoe and 134 kilometres from Menindee. Darnick is the focus point of the rural community comprising of a local community hall and tennis courts.

The topography of the Darnick area has extensive plains with few dunes, low sandy accumulations and small drainage sinks; relief to five metres; calcerous red earths and solonized brown soils, with sands and sandy earths on dunes, and sandy texture-contrast soils on rises; scattered to clumped rosewood, belah, wilga and mulga, with narrow-leaf hop bush on sandy soils; dense bimble box in drainage sinks; abundant bottle washers, cannon-ball, variable spear grass, copper burrs and forbs.

1.3.3 Tilpa

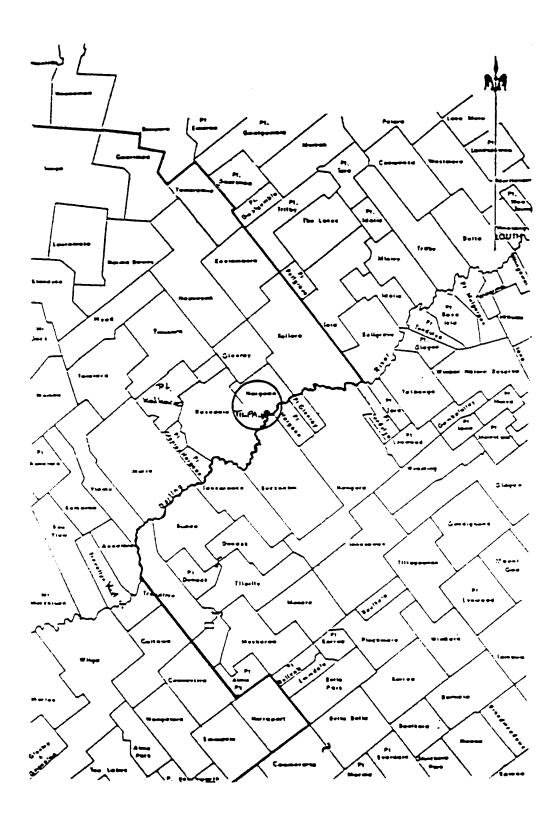
Tilpa is located on the Darling River (see Figure 10) in the northeast corner of Central Darling Shire Council, 129 kilometres from Wilcannia with the Darling River acting as the Council boundary (see Figure 1). Tilpa is the focus point of the surrounding rural community comprising of a community hall with sporting facilities such as tennis courts; an airstrip; and a local hotel. The present population of Tilpa is seven with the remaining population being rural based. Recently a couple of shacks have been constructed as private retreats for visiting fishermen.

Tilpa was pioneered in the mid 1800's and serves as an historical link with the past.

The topography of the Tilpa area adjacent to the River is open level plains of the Darling river, with grey gilgaid and crab-holey cracking heavy clays; small cane grass or lignum pans, minor drainage channels sometimes with black box and coolabah and scaldy grey clays; fringing brown and red cracking clays; abundant annual forbs, copper burrs and annual salt bushes.

The landscape moving away from Tilpa has parallel dunes of deep reddish clay-type sand with sparse mulga and rosewood; areas of narrow-leafed hopbush, abundant grasses and forbs; swales of calcerous loam with bottlewashers and scalded texture-contrast soils; cane grass and neverfail in grey clay swamps; isolated small salt lakes.

PART 2: AREAS OF ENVIRONMENTAL SENSITIVITY

A greater proportion of the Central Darling Shire Council has areas of environmental sensitivity. Areas known to be of environmental sensitivity included aboriginal sites, riverine corridors and associated floodplains.

2.1 Aboriginal Sites and Places

Two properties within the Central Darling Shire Council area have been declared Protected Archaeological Areas, to facilitate the protection of important Aboriginal sites. These are Mt Manara and Moona Vale (see Figure 11).

To date, the Department of Environment and Climate Change have carried out detailed archaeological surveys for areas within the Central Darling Shire Council area including the following;

- (a) The South west corner; where an archaeological survey of midden sites only (i.e. sites with evidence of shellfish and fish remains which have been used for food, possibly associated with other evidence such as stone tools, hearths, burials in the same sites) has been carried out along the South part of Talyawalka Creek, the Talyawalka Lakes, Menindee Lakes, and small sections of the Darling River near Wilcannia. The survey has confirmed the importance of the area for the study of Aboriginal prehistory over at least the last 25,000 years.
- (b) Wilcannia Common, where burials, scatters of stone artefacts, hearths and middens were found, with quarries nearby in the Netallie Hills. The Common covers a dry lakebed (Lake Woychugga) and is important for its archaeological sites and the particular interest that Aborigines from Wilcannia have in the sites. In the past 24 months Lake Woytchugga has been fenced with grant monies received from Western Catchment Management Authority to further protect this site.
- (c) The route of the Natural Gas Pipeline across the northern edge of the Central Darling Shire Council; numerous surface sites were found along the pipeline, particularly in the vicinity of the Paroo channels, the edge of the Darling/Talyawalka floodplain, and in the North west corner of the Central Darling Shire Council where quarries were also found on the ridge outcrops. The density of sites along the pipeline transect indicates the general richness of this Northern half of the Central Darling Shire Council.
- (d) Throughout the Paroo- Darling National Park

In total listed on Department of Environment and Climate Change records there are 1564 aboriginal sites found within the Central Darling Shire area. The following list provides an indication of the number of sites discovered in the Shire to date

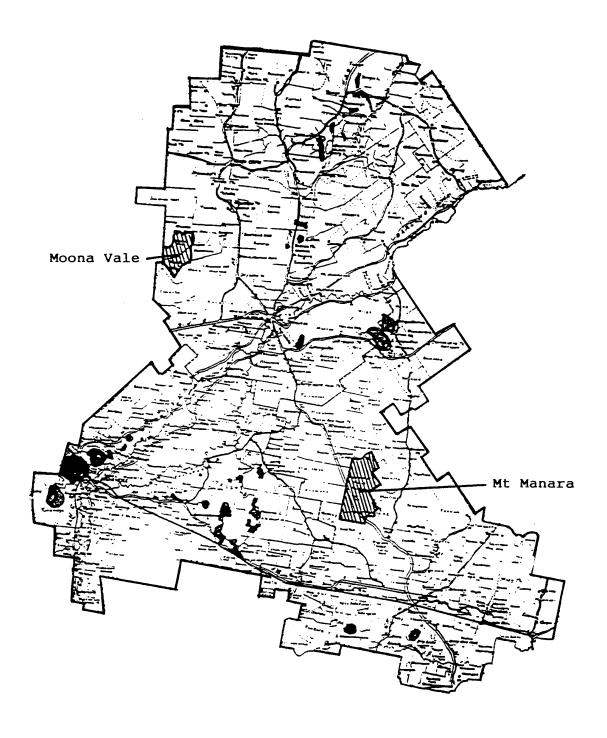

2.2 Riverine Corridors and Asociated Floodplains

Two rivers flow through Cental Darling being the Paroo River and the Darling River. Associated with these rivers are large areas of floodplains. The immediate riverine corridor associated with these two waterways are considered to be environmentally sensitive. Under Council's Local Environmental Plan 2004 land within 50 metres (in a horizontal line) of the top bank of the Paroo and Darling Rivers is considered to be environmentally sensitive land. Council consent for development within this area is required before any development can be undertaken.

2.2 Built Environment

2.2.1 Historical Sites

There are significant historical sites within the Central Darling Shire Council; many of these are listed with the National Trust of Australia (NSW). A comprehensive list is provided in Table 1. Council's Local Environmental Plan 2004 lists many of these sites. Owners of heritage items listed in the LEP will not be able to alter or demolish these buildings without Council giving consideration to the heritage value of the building prior to making a determination. A further nine items from Tilpa and White Cliffs have been listed under Councils LEP Amendment No 1 gazetted in Decemder 2010.

2.2.2 Townships

There are several features within the built environment that are distinguished landmarks of the Central Darling Shire Council; one being the township of White Cliffs, for it's fluctuating population of Opal Miners and Tourists; and the other being the Menindee Lakes Storage System.

Characteristics of the White Cliffs Township that make it unique

- 1. Dugouts have housed people at White Cliffs since the first summer of 1890 when miners roofed shallow shafts with canvas or brush against the intense heat. These dugouts were the first on any opal field and, before 1900; the town featured a large underground restaurant, a bakery and hotel, beer bar while almost every above ground dwelling had a cellar for cool storage of most items. Today dugouts are a major attraction in White Cliffs, especially those with show rooms.
- 2. The wedge shaped platforms of mullock excavated from dugouts were the inspiration for the two huge forecourts of the new Parliament House, Canberra. The architect saw an aerial photograph of such platforms and used the shape in his design.

- 3. Abundant sunshine made White Cliffs the ideal location for the world's first experimental solar station to power small outback settlements in 1981. It proved the value of the converted marine steam engine, showed fewer collecting dishes would produce adequate power for a small town, and proved that a lack of bore water could be overcome by recycling distilled water brought when needed from elsewhere. Lack of funding, insufficient power to meet the demands of local householders and other problems caused it to close in 1992, it is now however utilised as a tourist attraction. White Cliffs was named a photographers' paradise in the 1980's by a French Video Crew for its unique township and lunar landscape opal field, its clear air, clear skies and superb sunsets.
- 4. White Cliffs Opal has several unique features. It is seam opal, the first ever found, its quality can be valued in the rough, it is easy to clean, and less likely to shatter while being cut or polished. White Cliffs produced abundant and unknown opal specimens like belemnites, shells, wood, plesiosaur tusks, bones of extinct marine animals and pseudomorphs called "pineapples" (glauberite crystals replaced by opal and found nowhere else). "Painted ladies" were waterrounded rocks from the glacial era with opal coating on part of the outside or as veins and layers within. In 1977, the most complete opalised skeleton of a 100 million year old plesiosaur found (until that time) was unearthed.
- 5. Opal miner William Bennett represented White Cliffs at the first ever NSW Mining Conference in Sydney in February 1896 when opal was discussed for the first time, and Bennett proved to be the first delegate from any Australian Opal field. It was his resolutions that eventually led to the abolition of huge mineral leases and of four-acre claims, and to the introduction of 100 square foot claims, later to become today's standard 50 by 50 metre claims in the state.

2.2.3- Characteristics of Menindee Lakes Storage System

Before the construction of the storage scheme, Menindee Lakes was a series of nine natural ephemeral lakes adjacent to the Darling River. The scheme was built over the period 1949 to 1968 and is a series of small dams, weirs, regulators, channels and levees designed to retain Darling River flood waters. The main structure is the Menindee Main Weir over the Darling River. An inlet regulator allows water to pass from Lake Wetherell to Lake Pamamaroo and water can be transferred from Lake Pamamaroo to Lake Menindee through an inter-connecting channel and artificially created small lake known as Copi Hollow and inlet regulator. Lake Cawndilla is connected to Lake Menindee by the interconnecting Cawndilla Creek, which has no regulating structure. Releases are made to the Darling through outlet regulators from Lake Wetherell, Lake Pamamaroo and Lake Menindee as well as from the Main Weir. Lake Cawndilla can drain to Lake Menindee only and not directly to the Darling River.

2.3 Salinisation

Dry land salinity is the build up of salt in surface soil usually as a result of a rising water table and subsequent ground water seepage. This is commonly called a saline seep. Dry land salinity refers to non-irrigated areas showing a salt problem. No obvious salt affected areas are known to Council in the Central Darling area.

2.4 River Systems and Catchment Areas

The Paroo and Darling Rivers are considered to be areas of environmental sensitivity. The Central Darling Shire Council is dissected by the Darling River entering the Council boundary north of Tilpa and exiting south of Menindee. Other main tributaries are the Paroo River and channel system, entering the council boundary in the north adjacent to Tongo Station, and joining the Darling River north of Wilcannia.

The Menindee Lakes and storage system (see Figure 7) serve as an intermediary storage facility from water being supplied by the Darling River and to the Great Anabranch Water Supply.

Much of the river and lakes are used for recreational purposes such as fishing and boating.

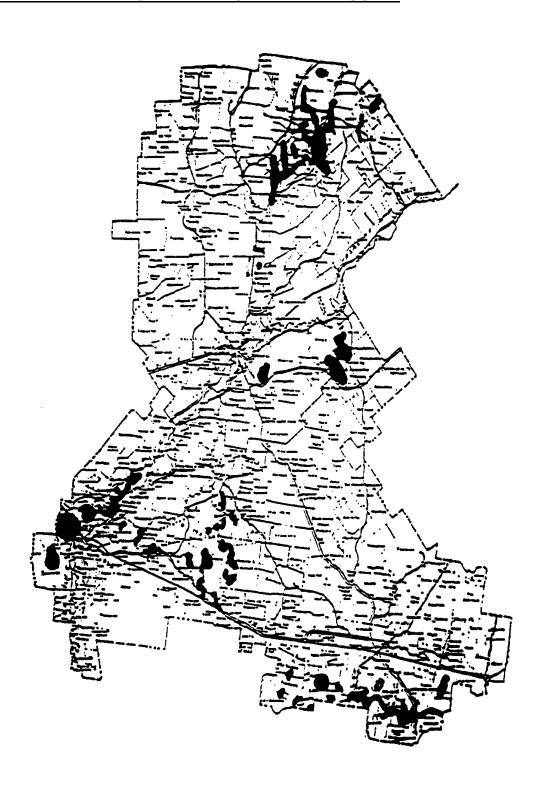
Water quality is affected by land use within the catchment. Pollution sources include irrigation discharges and run-off from urban and rural land. River bank activities also have the potential to affect water quality by discharging sediment when vegetation is removed. Blue green algae contiues to be a problem up and down the Darling River, and blooms during the warmer summer months causing water quality problems for urban and rural water users throughout the Shire. The Darling River water supply is providing to be a relatively unreliable water supply for dependant users. However, heavy rains in the catchment in early 2010 has put water in the river and filled the Menindee Lakes system.

2.5 Wetlands

Overflow lakes and their foreshores in the Central Darling Shire Council area are important natural features some with value as wetlands (see Figure 12), and many with potential archaeological value. There are many overflow lakes along the stretch of the Darling River. In the past twelve months most of these lakes have filled as result of the wide spread flooding across the area as a result of large flows down the Darling. This area received higher than average rainfall, and as a result wide spread flooding as apparent.

Water birds in particular require a variety of wetland types throughout western New South Wales to cover their requirements of breeding and feeding in a region of erratic rainfall. Some relatively permanent wetlands are important as drought refuges while ephemeral wetlands may support large populations of breeding water birds when they are flooded.

2.6 Native Vegetation

The total Central Darling Shire Council area still remains intact with native vegetation and bush land, apart from various introduced plant species and weeds, and minor development related to horticultural, residential and mining activities surrounding the townships. The Department of Primary Industries and the Department of Environment and Heritage have carried out extensive research of the vegetation in the area. As the Paroo Darling National Park has been gazetted in the Shire during the past few years, vegetation mapping has been undertaken at a number of sites in these areas. This data is held by Department of Environment and Heritage.

2.6.1 Native Vegetation Communities found in the Central Darling Shire

Mulga

- Occurs in the North West.
- Found on red earths of sandplains and dune fields and skeletal soils of hills and ranges.
- On rocky ranges, associated flora includes White Cyprus pine (Callitris comlmellaris), beef wood (Grevilla striata), Whitewood (Atalaya hemiglauca), Red box (Eucalyptus intertexa) and Dead finish (Acacia tetragonophylla).
- In the west, Mulga (acacia aneura) is interspersed with bladder saltbush (Atriplex vesicaria) and/or Bluebush (Maireana sp.) communities also known as shrublands.

Shrublands

These communities are associated with species such as Black box (Eucalyptus largiflorens) or Myall, Cotton bush (Marireana aphylla) and Dillon bush (Nitraria billardiera) as well as localised stands of Old Man Saltbush (Atriplex nummularia).

Belah (Casuarina cristata) & Rosewood (Heterodendrum Oleifolium)

- Can occur as individuals or as scattered clumps.
- Associated understorey of Spiny saltbush (Atrilpex spinibractea), Copperburrs (Bassia sp.), Ruby saltbush (Enchylaena tomentose), Bluebush (Maireana sp.) Grasses and herbs.
- Areas beyween clumps may be grasslands or shrublands dominated by Bluebush.
- Other associated species include Yarran (Acacia sp.) and Nelia (Acacia loderi) which occur between stands.
- In dense scrub, associated species are Yarran, Wilga (Geijera parviflora), Sugarwood (Myoporum platycarpum) and Eremophila sp.

Black Box

- Common along self mulching soils of major river and creek floodplains and as fringing communities around ephemeral (non permanent) lakes.
- ➤ Cooba (Acacia oswaldii), Eurah (Eremophila bignoniflora), Belah, Flowering lignum (Meuhlenbeckia cunninghamil), and leafless cherry (Exocarpos Ground cover is variable and can consist of forbs and perennial grasses or annuals.

Red Gum (Eucalyptus camaldulensis)

- Occur along major rivers and associated swamps and billabongs as well as ephemeral creeks.
- Can grow in grey clays or sandy soils.
- Cooba, River cooba, Yellowbox (Eucalyptus melliodora), Miljee & lignum are other species which occur with red gum stands. These communities can give way to Black box and coolibah (Eucalyptus microtheca).
- ➤ A ground flora of grasses, sedges, forbs and some low shrubs are typical in Red gum communities.

Grasses that may occur include: Curly Mitchell grass (Astrebla lappacea); Windmill grass (Chloris truncata); White top (Danthonia caespitose); Cotton panic grass (Digitaria brownie); Finger bottle washers (Enneapogon avenaceus); Curly windmill grass (enteropogon avenaceus); Curly windmill grass (Enteropogon acicularis); Canegrass (Eragrotis australasica); Mulka (Eragrostis dielsii); Woolybutt (Eragrostis eripoda); purple love grass (Eragrostis lacunaria), Neverfail (Eragrostis setifolia); Barley Grass (Hordeum leporinum); Bandicoot grass (Monachather paradoxa); Blown grass (agrostis avenacea); Kerosene Grass (Aristida contorta); Wire grass (aristida jerichoensis); Red leg grass (Bothriochloa macra); Buffel grass (Cenchrus ciliaris); Spiny burr grass (Cenchrus incertus); Button grass (Dactyloctenium redulans); Native millet (Panicum decompositum; Hairy Panic (Panicum effusum); Box grass (paspalidium constrictum); Warrego Summer grass (Paspalidium jubiflorum); Fairy grass (Sporobolus caroli); Yanganbil (Stipa bigeniculata); Rough speargrass (Stipa scabra); Tuckers speargrass (Stipa tuckeri); Kangaroo grass (Themeda australis); Mulga grass (Thyridolepis mitchelliana); small burr grass (Tragus australianus); Five-minute grass (Tripogon loliiformis)

There are also 61 forbs or broad leaf herbs possibly occurring at any time depending on landform, soil type as well as rainfall.

2.6.2 Flora and Fauna Species found in the Central Darling Shire

A wide variety of flora and fauna species have been sighted throughout the Shire area. A comprehensive list is located within Appendix 1 of this report.

Due to minimal development occurring within the Shire it is predicted unlikely that species have been destroyed due to works being undertaken. Most development is associated within previously disturbed areas such as townships and villages. Minimal development occurs in rural areas of the Shire.

2.7 Water Quality Of Rivers

Department of Natural Resources monitor water quality flowing through the Darling River System, with assistance from the Central Darling Shire Council. Council collects water samples from Tilpa in the north of the shire to "Culpaulin Station" south of Wilcannia. The collection of water samples enables blue green algae growth to be monitored with sampling generally occuring over the warmer months. Sampling sites are located at Tilpa, Tilpa Weir, Trevallyn Station, Atley, Wilcannia Weir Pool and Culpaulin Station. The past 12-month period has seen blue green algae bloom in summer months, although reported levels were not as serious as have been in previous years.

Due to the Darling River having a good water flow in the past 12 months blue green algae sampling has been minimal. Oxygen level readings were undertaken in early 2011 in response to fish deaths upstream at Bourke. Fortunately, oxygen levels in Central Darling remained at acceptable levels and no fish deaths occurred.

2.7.1 Listing of probable danger areas

During summer periods it is not uncommon for the entire length of the Darling River through out the shire to be affected by Med-High levels of blue green algae. Water salinity is also becoming an increasing issue along this stretch of the Darling River, and varies depending on river flows and water quantity. Electrical conductivity levels are generally in the vicinity of 150-800 uS/cms on average pending river flows. The first flows usually bring a salty plume of 1500 – 2000 uS/cms. Salty plumes from underground acquifers flowing into the river are often a problem after flood events, and enter the river near Louth. Salt levels rise at this time, further investigation has been undertaken by government agencies as to the extent and source of the salty plume. No further information is available at this time.

2.8 Bushfire Sensitivity

During the hot dry summer period, Central Darling Shire Council is prone to bushfire.

Bush fires in the past have devastated large areas of native wildlife, vegetation and caused commercial property and stock losses.

Central Darling Shire Council is divided into six bushfire control zones being Wilcannia, Ivanhoe, Menindee, Menindee Town and Environs, White Cliffs, Mossgiel and Darnick (see Figure 13).

Approximately 17 threatened flora species occur in the Central Darling Shire. When necessary a mosaic of hazard reduction burning in these areas will assist to maintain Biodivesity in the long term; by allowing fire suppression efforts that minimise the area burnt by devastating uncontrolled high intensity wildfire. Vegetation communities that should not be burnt are chenopod low woodland and Mitchell grass tussock grasslands

The Central Darling Shire Council area has a large number of fauna species. In considering the impact of wildfire and prescribed burning it is important to recongise that these areas experience fire very infrequently and only following several years of high rain and above average growth.

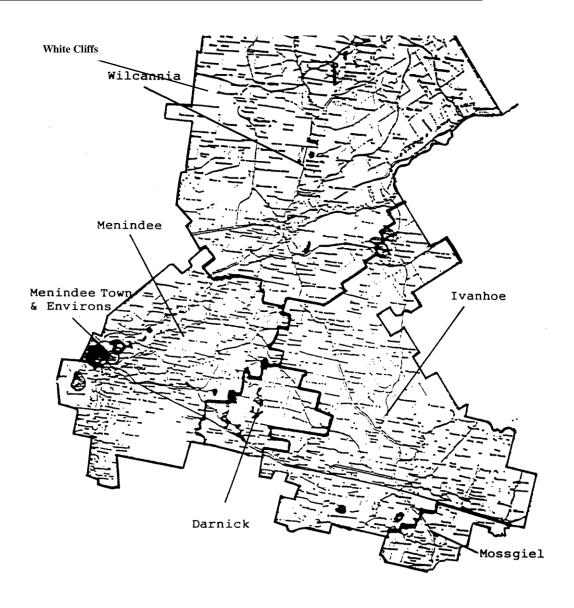
Adverse wildfire impacts are greatest where high intensity wildfires burn over broad areas and burn in conditions that leave few unburnt areas/patches. The adverse impacts on fauna of such fires include:

- Widespread and near complete removal of food sources for immediate post fire recovery.
- Destruction of ground habitat structures such as fallen logs and tussock grasses.
- Removal of senescent, hollow bearing habitat trees.
- Improved access for feral predator species and near complete removal of refuge for species susceptible to preditation.

2.9 Unique Landscape and Vegetation

The overlap between sections in Part 2 is considerable and the placement of some issues into one or the other group has been subjective. Despite this, a number of unique areas have been considered.

2.10. National Parks In Central Darling Shire

There are two National Parks in the Central Darling Shire Council; Kinchega National Park and Paroo Darling National Park.

2.10.1 Kinchega National Park

Gazetted in 1967, this large park occupies 44,181 hectares of arid landscape. Situated approximately 160 kilometres south of Wilcannia, it is dominated by the Darling River and its associated system of flood channel and overflow lakes, but also includes extensive areas of red sand plains. The four major natural environments in the park are the overflow lakes (although the park surrounds the lakes, the lake beds are not part of the park) the river flood plains, the red sand country and the lunettes.

2.10.2 Paroo Darling National Park

The Paroo Darling National Park is located approxmately 300km north-east of Broken Hill, 70kms north of Wilcannia and 20kms east of White Cliffs. The name change from Peery National Park to Paroo Darling National Park was gazetted in October 2002. The Park covers the former station properties of Peery, Arrowbar, Mandalay, Wilga, Coonavitra, Mt Murchison and Tilpilly.

The park has a rich cultural heritage reaching back over many thousands of years through to the present day. Evidence of this long habitation include artefact scatters, hearth sites, Aboriginal art sites and from latter years, the remnants of the pastoral industry including the "Kidman" era.

2.11 Wildlife and Habitat Corridors

Due to the fact that the Central Darling Shire Council area could be classified as one large corridor, information on wildlife and habitat corridors is not available due to limited need for it by Council in the past. Work for future reports should aim to collect this information. It is only then that an assessment of linkages between other areas and the degradation of corridors can be undertaken.

2.12 Threatened Species and Recovery Plans

2.12.1 Threatened Species

The Central Darling Shire Council area has an abundance of flora and fauna of which there are several threatened species. The following Table 2 identifies those threatened species that are present in the Shire area (see Figure 14).

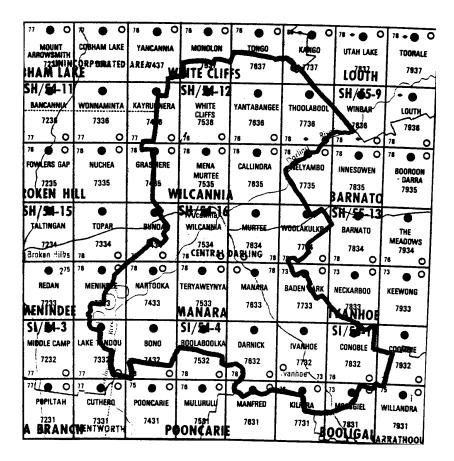

2.12.2 Threatened Species Recovery Plans

The National Parks and Wildlife Service has recovery plans operating in the Central Darling Shire Council area, some of these include:

Wildlife Refuges:

Declared over privately owned rural land with the consent of the owner for the purpose of preserving, conserving, propagating and studying wildlife; conserving and studying natural environments; and simulating natural environments.

Game Reserves:

Declared over private or Crown land and provide for game conservation in its broadest sense, including the hunting of game for recreation.

These refuges and reserves along with National Parks and Nature Reserves play a major role in the preservation of threatened species.

2.13. Any Related Instruments on Vegetation Cover; including any Instruments Relating to Tree Preservation

2.13.1 Bush Land Management Plans including Fire Management Plans

Operations Coordination Plan

Central Darling Shire Council has an Operations Coordination Plan that is reviewed biannually.

The aims of the Plan are:

- the protection of: life and property, community assets and values and natural and cultural heritage; and
- to decrease the severity and intensity of wildfires

A copy of this plan is available from Council's Environmental Services Department.

Council has also received an endorsed plan from the NSW Rural Fire Service outlining Bushfire Prone Land within Central Darling. The plan can be viewed at Council's Environmental Services Department.

Bush Fire Risk Management Plan

The Bush Fire Risk Management Plan is a separate document.

The aims of this Plan are:

- to enable the coordination of fuel management activities of all involved authorities on the Bush Fire Management Committee
- to ensure the best possible protection against the effects of bush fires is provided to the Communities of the Central Darling Shire Council area
- to enable the development of a mosaic of fuel reduced areas in the Central Darling Shire Council area, designed to protect life, property and other community assets from the effects of bush fire by:
 - identifying those fuels in the Central Darling Shire Council area which constitute a hazard;
 - setting strategies to be used to manage the accumulation of fuels in the areas identified; and
 - identifying those fuels in the Central Darling Shire Council area, which need to be, managed to protect cultural heritage and to promote biodiversity.

A copy of this plan is available from Council's Environmental Services Department.

Bush Land Management

Many other articles on Bush Land Management for the Central Darling Shire area are available from the Department of Natural Resources. The preservation of vegetation and trees in the Central Darling Shire Council is greatly enhanced through the efforts of Land care Groups and the input and interaction with Catchment Management Authorities.

Bushfire Prone Land Map

Council has a bushfire prone land map pertaining to the whole Shire. The map displays possible fuel load ratings depending on type of vegetation coverage. No areas of high concern have been identified in the Shire.

2.13.2 Tree Preservation Plans

Central Darling Shire Council has no tree preservation plans in place at the present time. However older vegetation generally associated with heritage items being present on listed heritage sites is protected.

2.14 Environmental Restoration Projects

Local Land Care and environmental groups associated within the Central Darling Shire Council are playing a major role in environmental awareness by involving the community when undertaking tree planting and the eradication of woody weeds and exotic plants.

Council has an annual tree planting programme. Table 3 displays trees planted in the Shire area under this programme for the past ten years.

PART 3: PRESSURES ON THE ENVIRONMENT

The Central Darling Shire does not suffer the same range of intense pressures as most urban areas as a result of human activities.

3.1 Polluted Areas

3.1.1 Water Pollution

The Darling River and Catchment system is a characteristic part of the environment of the Central Darling Shire. It would appear that degradation to the Darling River and catchment area has been minimal from activities undertaken with the shire.

3.1.2 Air Pollution

Central Darling Shire Council has no apparent air pollution problems apart from seasonal bush fires and illegal burning activites.

3.1.3 Noise Pollution

Central Darling Shire Council has no significant noise pollution problems. Community noise is probably the only cause of alarm, particularly domestic animal noise (such as dogs barking at night); few complaints have been recorded with Council to date and are usually dealt with through negotiation. Some noise complaints have been registered at Menindee, associated with gas guns to scare birds in the Menindee Environs in association with horticultural activities. Also noise from motor bike riders in close vicinity of homes on blocks in Menindee Environs have been reported.

3.1.4 Unhealthy Building Land

All of the piece or parcel of land situated at White Cliffs in the Shire of Central Darling in the Parish of Kirk, County of Yungnulgra, being Lot 365 DP 44260, is recorded as unhealthy building land. Other areas of undesignated unhealthy building land are present throughout the Shire and include the following; commissioned rubbish disposal areas in each town and village, the site of the former Tilpa rubbish disposal area, the site of the former Wilcannia effluent evaporation ponds, and an asbestos disposal area located at the Correctional Services Centre in Ivanhoe.

3.1.5 Sewerage Effluent Disposal

The township of Wilcannia has a pumped common effluent system that serves approximately ninety per cent of the town. Effluent for the town reticulation is delivered to oxidation ponds for settlement with excess water overflowing into evaporation ponds for evaporation.

All other townships in the Shire are not connected to a common effluent system and utilise on-site management techniques, however, it is proposed that Menindee will be connected to a common effluent reticulation scheme in the future.

Disposal of septic tank contents is at Council's waste depots except for the town of Wilcannia, where the contents are disposed of into an unused evaporation pond when the need arises.

3.1.6 Landfill and Waste Disposal Sites

At present, all townships in Central Darling Shire Council have a land fill for domestic waste disposal. The landfill sites in Ivanhoe and Menindee were reconstructed during 1994/95, creating approximately 10 years' extra capacity. The landfill site at Wilcannia was reconstructed during the 1995/96 periods creating approximately 15 years' extra capacity. Due to illegal burning at some of the landfills, usage of void space has been extended somewhat and the above timeframes vary somewhat.

3.1.7 Industrial Pollution (including Mines and Quarries)

Industrial pollution within the Central Darling Shire Council area is negligible. At this stage the mining operations at White Cliffs pose minimal threat to the environment.

3.2 Waste Management Policies

Council is currently in the process of reviewing waste management throughout the Shire. Council has recently joined the Netwaste group of Shires with a vision to gradually commence reducing waste streams presently going to landfill. Minimal recycling is undertaken throughout the Shire and the bulk of the waste is disposed of through use of landfills. In early 2006 Council reviewed it's waste management practices at Menindee, and implemented changes through its 2006/2007 Management Plan. These changes included extending the garbage pickup to include properties located in the Menindee Environs, restricting access to the waste depot to 3 hours per day, 5 days per week, and introducing gate fees relating to amount and type of waste being diposed of. Similar changes have also now been introduced to the Wilcannia Waste Depot and Ivanhoe Waste Depot. These techniques are not expected to be altered in the short to meduium term.

3.3 Storage And Disposal Sites Of Toxic And Hazardous Chemicals

There is very little information on contaminated sites in the Central Darling Shire Council area. Areas of concern are the location and number of disused rural property tips as these may contain unused chemicals associated with the managing of livestock.

The number and location of old service stations or fuel storage depots are also unknown. There are various motor service stations or fuel depots operating within the Council boundary and these would contain large amounts of flammable liquids, in addition to this it is not uncommon for these locations to have liquid petroleum gas (LPG) storage facilities. LPG is inherently hazardous and needs extremely careful handing. It is of vital importance that LPG facilities be installed in the correct location to provide an acceptable degree of safety.

<u>Part 4: Development Proposals likely to effect Community Land or Environmentally Sensitive Land</u>

No major developments affecting community land or environmentally sensitive land were undertaken or proposed within the Shire during the reporting period. A number of developments were undertaken in Wilcannia, the largest ones being the new Safehouse and CDEP Shed. In Ivanhoe a workers camp has been constructed by Transfield at the Ivanhoe campdraft grounds

4.1 Local Environmental Plan

Council undertook an amendment to the Local Environmental Plan to address zoning issues at White Cliffs in relation to dug-outs. The amendment has been gazetted and was made in December 2010.

Council's Comprehensive LEP is in the process of being made and is due for gazettal in late 2011. This plan will align Central Darling with the remainder of NSW, as the instrument is being made under State legislation. Some changes to zoning will occur to towns and villages across the Shire, however generally the new plan will mirror the provisions under the existing LEP and Amendment 1.
